THE M. E. CONFERENCE.

The semi-centennial session of the Erie M. E. Conference was held at Sharon, Pa., Sept. 10, in the First Episcopal Church. Bishop L. W. Merrill presided. The roll-called showed 120 brethren present. Rev. I. H. Beck was elected Secretary, Rev. W. W. Painter Recording Secretary, Rev. A. H. Holmes Statistical Secretary, and the Revs. C. M. Morse, A. R. Rich and W. N. Stone Assistant Secretaries. The committee to nominate standing committees reported and the report was adopted. The report of the Treasurer of the Centenary Fund Society, with a draft for \$132, was presented. Rev. S. E. Ryan was appointed Conference Postmaster. The case of J. M. Dewoody, asking an appeal from decision of quarterly conference at Tionesta, was presented; the conference entertained appeal. On motion the case was referred to a committee of fifteen members of conference. J. Graham, G. W. Clark and O. L. Mead were appointed a committee to nominate the persons to try the case. The following persons were nominated and elected by conference: O. G. McEntire, R. C. Smith, P. P. Pinney, R. A. Stubbs, B. M. Foster, P. W. Schofield, B. F. Wade, E. R. Knapp, T. P. Warner, I. D. Darling, J. H. Herron, R. M. Warren, E. R. Creed, C. C. Hunt and B. F. Delo. The thirteenth question was taken up, and Cyrus H. Frampton, Wm. H. Bunce, Francis M. Small, Frank R. Peters, Beatty P. Linn and Charles O. Mead, having passed a satisfactory examination in the required studies, and their character, was passed and they were advanced to the second class of deacons. Samuel P. Douglass not having appeared before the committee of examination, his character passed and he was continued in the first class of deacons. The fourteenth question was taken up, and W. J. Barton, W. A. Baker, P. J. Slattery, H. A. Teats, S. E. Ryan, C. W. Miner, C. Jones, J. H. Reedy, George Collier and A. C. Ellis, having passed a satisfactory examination were elected to elders' orders. W. H. Swartz passed a satisfactory examination, but not having exercised the office of a traveling deacon for but one year, was continued as a deacon of the second class. The court for the hearing of the appeal of J. M. Dewoody was organized, with G. W. Clarke, chairman. J. P. Fradenburg, A. Wheeler and H. H. Moore were recognized as counsel for appellant. On motion all documents pertaining to this case were referred to the committee. On motion Presiding Elder Bray and Z. Armstrong were allowed to choose their assistant counsel.
