The hopes of success indulged in by the Democrats, which are based upon their pretence that the Republicans are deserting Mr. Quay, will turn to ashes in their teeth when the votes are counted. There are no factions in the Republican party this year, and Mr. Quay was nominated with a unanimity that shows that he really was the choice of the Republican people of the State.

The New York State Democratic convention has shown in its nomination for Governor more than it is likely to do in its resolutions, the wide disparity between its purpose, and the purpose of President Cleveland. Ever since Hill became Governor, by the resignation of Cleveland, he has been by his official acts, and the influence which went out from his office, the exponent of the old order of things.

We are also bound in justice to the public interests to keep plainly in view the opposition of his party to his views and the constant friction caused by its efforts to defeat his purpose. Hill has been the official head of this opposition since he came into power; his veto of the census appropriation because the Legislature refused to place the appointment of enumerators exclusively in his hands, was but one of the acts illustrating this opposition, and his nomination by so decided a vote in the convention, shows that the party is with him and not with the President. In the canvass which is to follow, this position will become the vital issue. Those who would sustain the President's hands must oppose Hill.

Proclamation of General Election.

Whereas, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled 'An Act to regulate the Election of the Commonwealth,' passed the 21 day of July, A. D. 1885, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within this Commonwealth to give public notice of the General Elections, and in such to enumerate: 1st. The officers to be elected. 2d. The places at which the election is to be held.

presence of each other. The judge shall be sworn by the minority who administered the oath. If any judge or minority inspector refuses or fails to swear the officers of election in the manner required by this act, or if any officer of election shall act without being duly sworn, or if any officer of election shall certify that any officer was sworn when he was not, it shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisoned not exceeding one year, or both, in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 11. It shall be lawful for any qualified citizen of the district, notwithstanding the name of the proposed voter is contained on the list of voters, to challenge the vote of such person, whereupon the proof of the right of suffrage as is now required by law shall be publicly made and acted upon by the election board and the vote admitted or rejected, according to the evidence. Every person coming to be a naturalized citizen shall be required to produce his naturalization certificate at the election before voting, except where he has been for five years consecutively a voter in the district in which he offers to vote; and on the vote of such person being received, it shall be the duty of the election officers to write or stamp on such certificate the word 'voted,' with the day, month and year; and if any election officer or officers shall receive a second vote on the same day, by virtue of some certificate, except where sons are entitled to vote because of the naturalization of their fathers, they and the officer who shall offer such second vote, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, at the discretion of the court; but the fine shall not exceed five hundred dollars in each case, nor the imprisonment one year. The like punishment shall be inflicted on an election officer who shall refuse to make or cause to be made the endorsement required aforesaid on said naturalization certificate.

Sec. 12. If any election officer shall refuse or neglect to require such proof of the right of suffrage as is prescribed by this law, or laws to which this act is a supplement, from any person offering to vote whose name is not on this list of assessed voters, or whose right to vote without requiring such proof, every person so offending shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be sentenced for every such offense, to pay a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or to undergo an imprisonment of not more than one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.

ARTICLE VIII. SUFFRAGE AND ELECTION.

Sec. 1. Every male citizen twenty or more years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections: First.—He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month. Second.—He shall have resided in the State one year, or, if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have resided in the county and returned, for six months, at least, to the place of his residence immediately preceding the election.

Sec. 2. The general election shall be held annually on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November, but the General Assembly may, by law, fix at any year, the day, month and year, at the pleasure of each House consenting thereto. The qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth, at all general, township, borough and special elections are hereby authorized, authorized and required to vote by tickets printed or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges of courts voted for and shall be labeled 'Judiciary'; one ticket shall embrace the names of all the State officers voted for, and shall be labeled 'State'; one ticket shall embrace the names of all the county officers voted for, including office of Senator and member of Assembly, if voted for, and member of Congress, if voted for, and be labeled 'County'; one ticket shall embrace the names of all the township officers voted for, and shall be labeled 'Township'; one ticket shall embrace the names of all the borough officers voted for, and shall be labeled 'Borough'; and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot boxes.

Notice is hereby given, that any person excepting Justices of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, or this State, or any city or incorporated district, whether commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislature, executive or judiciary department of this State, or of any city, or of any incorporated district, or of any member of Congress and of the State Legislature, or of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of such election shall be eligible to be then voted for.

The Judges of the aforesaid districts shall representatively take charge of the certificates of return of the election of their respective districts, and produce the same to the Prothonotary of the Borough of Tionesta, as follows: All judges living within twelve miles of the Prothonotary's office, or within twenty-four miles if their residence be in a town, village or city upon the line of a railroad leading to the county seat, shall before two o'clock p. m., on WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER FOURTH, 1885, and all other judges shall before twelve o'clock, m., on THURSDAY, NOVEMBER FIFTH, 1885, deliver said returns, together with the return sheets, to the Prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas of Forest county, which said returns shall be filed, and the day and hour of filing marked thereon, and shall be preserved by the Prothonotary for public inspection.
