Clark, and comrades Holt, Grimler, Phillips, Gifford, Barnett and McLatchey were appointed to raise funds for the erection of a suitable monument on Little Round Top, Gettysburg, where the regiment bore the blunt of the battle and where the brave Colonel Vincent met his death.
