NEW LAWS.

The Clarion Democrat gives the following synopsis of acts of assembly passed by the last legislature, which will be found of general interest to people in our county:

CANADA THISTLE. The former act amended so that the fine of \$15 instead of going one half to the County Treasurer and the other half to the informer, now is paid entirely to the school district in which the land is situated.

The section allowing persons aggrieved to enter upon the lands of another after five days notice and cut down the thistles and sue for pay, is amended so that parties aggrieved by the neglect of land owners to cut and destroy the thistles on their own lands, may notify the constable or supervisor of the district who must give the land owner five days notice to cut and destroy the thistles, upon the failure of the land owner to do this the officer must enter upon the premises with such other persons as he may employ and cut down and destroy the thistles, and recover from the land owners compensation at the rate of \$2.50 per day. The officer also gets a fee of 50 cents and six cents mileage, circular, for serving the notice. It is also made the duty of the supervisors to destroy the Canada thistles growing along the public roads. And any supervisor or constable who refuses or neglects to perform the duties prescribed by this act is liable to a fine of ten dollars.

ADULTERATION OF DAIRY PRODUCTS. Any person who shall manufacture or have in possession with intent to sell, any oleomargarine or any compound to take the place of butter or cheese produced from pure unadulterated milk or cream, which covers all mixtures of lard or tallow with butter for sale as an article of food, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall pay a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$300 and imprisonment in the county jail of not less than ten days nor more than thirty days for the first offense. Each subsequent offense one year's imprisonment. It is the duty of constables to report any violation of this act in making their returns to court.

CRIMINALS MAY TESTIFY. Persons charged with misdemeanor or felony, may if they wish, testify in their own defense.

MERCHANTS USING LOTTERY—SCHEMES TO SECURE PATRONAGE. Any person doing business who shall offer any ticket, check etc., to any customer, entitling him to receive money or any article of value shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 or imprisonment not exceeding one year.

DEFAULTING TAX COLLECTORS. Any person charged with the collection or safe-keeping of any taxes shall appropriate the same to his own use or fail to pay over the same as required by law shall be liable to imprisonment not exceeding five years or a fine not exceeding \$5000.

TROUT. It shall not be lawful to catch any speckled trout only from the 15th day of April to the 15th day of July, under penalty of \$10.

SCHOOL BOOKS. The directors may purchase out of the school funds the best books for use in the schools of the district and furnish them free of cost for the use of the pupils.

A SCHOOL MONTH. A common school month shall consist of 20 days actual teaching and no school shall be kept open on Saturday, legal holiday or during the time of holding the county institute.

WITNESS FEES. In all civil or criminal cases before justices of the peace, witnesses will be allowed 50 cents a day and 3 cents a mile for going and returning.

In addition to these the bill regulating the teaching of temperance hygiene in the public schools, providing for the burial of indigent soldiers and sailors, the payment of a bounty upon foxes, hawks, etc., the marriage license law and the new tax law have already been noticed at length in these columns. A number of other laws were passed of general importance, but as they relate more exclusively to matters in the courts we will not give them here.
