Carpenter was a standby in Warren now valuable because they are old. were taken by him. People sometimes wondered why he was photographing the streets and various old buildings. He took itthat is the flood, for the raging waters kept coming,-but he was so long getting a "focus" on the show that the barrels went on to Pittsburgh.
