A Would-be Suicide.

Wednesday evening of last week the town was thrown into no little excitement by the report that a man had attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat. A man by the name of B. H. Bowen, who lives in Bradford, Pa., passed through the town about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. It was noticed that he acted strangely, but as he disturbed no one he was not interfered with. He took the road leading to Tylersburg. About five o'clock he was discovered at "Gunnel Hill," about three miles from here, by Jesse Carson. When Mr. Carson came up to him he saw the snow covered with blood, and the man's throat and clothes saturated with it. Cosette Canfield, who was driving towards town soon came up; also Fred Schultz. The would-be suicide was disarmed, placed upon a wagon and brought to town; he was taken to Dr. Coburn's office where his injuries were examined and properly dressed. The doctor found a gash of about four and a half inches, extending from the left side of the neck under the ear to three-fourths of an inch beyond the centre of the neck. The cut was very deep, extending into the mouth near the base of the tongue, and the neck was terribly lacerated. The deed was accomplished by the use of the small blade of a common pocket knife. Had he cut a little deeper in the back part of the incision the jugular vein would have been severed, and death would have quickly followed.

After his wounds were properly dressed he was taken to the Central House, and his wife notified of the affair by telegraph. Next morning an answer came asking that Bowen be brought to Bradford, which was done. Mr. C. reports that he found the man's home and surroundings to be very pleasant. He seemed to be laboring under the delusion that he was to be hung and stated that he thought suicide preferable.

The Derrick mentions a novel fire which took place last Saturday, as follows. The rig in question adjoins the 400-acre tract owned and operated by Agnew, Proper & Haight. Miller & O'Dell lost the rig of their drilling well on lot 756, near Gusher city Saturday, by a novel accident. It seems they have had a fishing job on the well and must have been doing a good deal of running in and pulling out, as it appears the fire started at the crown pulley and is supposed to be the result of friction heat. Upon the discovery of the fire a man climbed the rig with a pail of water with the intention of putting out the fire, but before he could reach the top the flames had acquired so much headway that the courageous fireman was obliged to beat a hasty retreat. This is the first fire of its kind in the oil country. The Percapine oil company finished its No. 36 well, on warrant 3194, Balltown, last week.
