-Judge Paxson, of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, handed down an opinion, Monday, deciding that the Revenue law of June 30, 1885, is constitutional. This law provides that mortgages and other monied securities in the hands of corporations are taxable. He further rules that the provision of the Act exempting from taxation "notes or bids for work or labor done" is unconstitutional, but that this does not invalidate the en tire Act. Assessors are directed to report the same for taxation. The opinion concludes by stating that the entire revenue system of Pennsylvania needs to be remodeled in accordance with the new constitution.
