—Louis Moon, a 14-year-old lad of Mr. Cephas Moon of German Hill, accidentally shot himself in the left hand with a 22-calibre revolver last Saturday. The ball entered the hand about the centre and ascended upward toward the arm. The hand was so much swollen that the doctor's probe could not be inserted in the wound and the exact location of the ball is not yet known.

—Judge Paxson, of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, handed down an opinion, Monday, deciding that the Revenue law of June 30, 1885, is constitutional. This law provides that mortgages and other monied securities in the hands of corporations are taxable. He further rules that the provision of the Act exempting from taxation "notes or bids for work or labor done" is unconstitutional, but that this does not invalidate the entire Act. Assessors are directed to report the same for taxation. The opinion concludes by stating that the entire revenue system of Pennsylvania needs to be remodeled in accordance with the new constitution.

It started off at better than 100 barrels, but on the second or third day after completion it was deemed expedient to explode it. The well is now doing about eighty barrels a day. The Anchor company is drilling another well on the same land and has a rig in reserve for a third. Maj. Reed, the well known hotel man, gets a rake off from this well. J. C. Welch drilled two wells on 5214. May, Kelly & Grandin are drilling three wells in the same quarter, and between these three enterprising firms they manage to keep up an appearance of activity. The way the new wells decline indicates edge. N. F. Clark finished a well on the Stone lands this month and is now drilling another one and commencing a rig to-day. The finished well started off at 50 barrels. John Cocherane bought from the McCalmont oil company the Howe farm the Sheffield district, together with 25 wells and 62 barrels production. Court Minutes.

Court has been very busy since Monday. The grand jury returned a true bill for murder against Edward S. Walton. Also a true bill against J. M. Kepler for libel.

Commonwealth vs. J. M. Kepler, assault and battery, true bill. R. R. Andrews prosecutor. The Court refused all licenses on Tuesday afternoon.

The case of Mary E. Wareham vs. B. N. Y. & P. Ry. was nonsuited. Case of Haslett and Hulings vs. J. D. Lewis et al, involving the title to an island in Tionesta creek, in the rich Balltown oil field, was tried and verdict rendered for defendants.

On Tuesday afternoon the work of empaneling a jury in the Walton-Mealy murder trial began. When court adjourned for the day ten jurors were obtained when the panel was exhausted. The Sheriff was ordered to select talesmen and out of a large number gathered in two were finally selected. The jury is as follows: David Landers, Harmony twp.; Nathan Burdick, Hickory; Lewis Andre, Kingsley; James Elliott, Harmony; Leonard Barnes, Kingsley; John Young, Tionesta twp.; R. A. Childs, Green; C. J. Carlson, Tionesta boro; Jeff. Dean, Kingsley; W. J. Mohney, Green; Ernest Behrens, Green; Harvey Foreman, Tionesta boro. In the prosecution District Attorney Clark is assisted by A. B. Richmond of Meadville, B. J. Ried of Clarion, Miles W. Tate and J. B. Agnew of this place. The defense is conducted by J. H. Osmer of Franklin, and E. L. Davis of Tionesta. Maj. Reid was opening the case as we go press and we can therefore give none of the testimony at present. The case draws a good many spectators to the court house, and will be listened to with a great deal of interest.

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Terrible Tornado in Ohio.

The most furious tornado ever known in that section swept over the counties of Seneca, Hardin, Wyandotte and Mercer, in Ohio, on Friday night of last week, leaving death and desolation in its track. It is estimated that fifty persons have been killed and over five hundred more or less injured. Millions of property, was destroyed.

It is impossible to give any accurate figures regarding the loss of property at present. Much of the damage consists in the destruction of crops and timber, and the washing away of arable lands, and no one can place the real money valuation on any sort of property. Wires are down in all directions, and the news so far comes mainly from the larger towns, and not until the county districts are heard from will it be known just how disastrous the storm has been.
