WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30, '86. The House rejected all the amendments to the naval establishment bill adopted by the committee of the whole, and adopted, without amendment, Mr. Herbert's substitute, reported by the naval committee. In the bill as pass ed instead of three protected double bottomed cruisers one of the best speed is provided for, not to exceed in cost \$1,500,000; instead of four firstclass torpedo boats two such boats are provided for, to cost \$200,000. The provision of \$300,000 for a torpedo cruiser is stricken out. The completion of the monitors is provided for. The provision of \$1,000,000 towards the armament of the vessels, now nearly complete, is retained in the bill. The appropriation for torpedoes is re duced from \$125,000 to \$75,000; that for the ordnance from plant at some navy yard from \$250,000 to \$150,000. But part of the million for armament may be expended in tools, etc. Towards the construction and completion of the vessels provided for in the bill
