The Horse Embezzler

We gave a brief account yesterday of the arrest of a man named Fairbanks for the theft of a horse on Tuesday night from Wm. Moore, of Scrubgrass township. The Franklin letter in the Derrick says that Fairbanks stayed at Moore's on Monday night. He left on Tuesday, but was seen near there that evening. Wednesday morning the horse was missing and suspicion at once pointed at Fairbanks.

Parties started in pursuit. Nothing was heard of him till Thursday, when it was learned that he had been in Rockland township on Wednesday night. A prominent young attorney from Franklin, who represents a detective association, volunteered his services and on Thursday night had run his man to ground and had him arrested in Hickory. Wilson Cross and D. K. Buchanan went after him and yesterday brought him to this city and lodged him in jail. He was on the horse when found. This is the ninth horse stolen from Scrubgrass township and the first one recovered. Fairbanks seems likely to enter speedily upon a season of retirement.—Franklin News.

Constable Connelly made the arrest in the above case at Hickory, having received a telegram describing man and horse only a few minutes before they put in an appearance.

Borough Ordinance.

An Ordinance authorizing any Natural Gas Company accepting its terms to lay mains and pipes in and through the streets, &c., of the Borough of Tionesta, for the purpose of transporting, distributing and supplying natural gas.

Be it Ordained and enacted by the Town Council of the Borough of Tionesta, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of same: Sec. 1. That each and every Natural Gas Company filing with the Burgess its bond and written acceptance of the terms and provisions of this ordinance as herein after provided, is hereby granted the right and privilege to lay down, maintain, alter and repair iron mains and pipes in, through, and under the streets, avenues, lanes and alleys of this Borough, for the purpose of conveying, distributing and supplying natural gas to the citizens of said Borough for heating, lighting, manufacturing and other purposes.

Sec. 2. That the first company which shall enter the Borough under the provisions of this Ordinance, shall furnish sufficient gas to heat and light an engine-house, and to light fifteen (15) street lamps at a price not to exceed thirty (\$30) dollars per annum; and for each additional street lamp not more than two (\$2) dollars per annum. Said additional lamps to be located as the Borough authorities may direct. Provided, That the said Borough shall make all connections at its own cost and expense; And provided further, That when two or more companies shall introduce gas into this Borough, each company shall furnish an equivalent amount of gas for such purposes as the Borough authorities may direct, on the same terms as furnished by first company.

Sec. 3. Each company accepting the terms of this Ordinance, shall before they enter upon, or lay down their pipes or conductors, file with the Burgess a bond to said Borough, with sufficient surties to be approved by Council, in the sum of Two thousand dollars (\$2000), indemnifying said Borough from any and all actions, suits and prosecutions by reason of the opening of said streets and laying pipe in said Borough, which said bond shall also be conditioned for the faithful observance of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. The officers who in law have authority to and said Natural Gas Company, are hereby required to accept the terms of the above ordinance in writing and file the bond mentioned in section third of this ordinance, as a condition precedent to their right to enter within the limits of said Borough.
