GREAT EARTHQUAKES.

The City of Charleston, S. C., Nearly Destroyed.

The greatest earthquake ever known in this country occurred shortly before ten o'clock on Tuesday night of last week. It was felt throughout the United States east of the Mississippi river, the shocks being experienced from the Gulf nothward to the Upper Lakes and from points near the Mississippi eastward to the Atlantic coast. At Charleston, South Carolina, Montgomery, Alabama, Cleveland, Ohio, Raleigh, North Carolina, and Indianopolis, Indiana, the shocks seem to have been specially severe. At Montgomery, Selma, Lynchburg, Richmond, Washington, Cleveland, Memphis and other places, people rushed, panic stricken, into the streets.

Dispatches from Charleston, under date of Sept. 1st, give some idea of the awful severity of the shocks experienced in that city :

More than sixty persons were killed and wounded, chiefly colored. Among the whites killed and fatally injured are M. J. Lynch, Dr. B. Alexander Hammond making sheet iron. and Ainsley Robson. There is no way of leaving the city at present.

The principal business portion of the city was destroyed and bundreds of persons rendered homeless. Men were frantic and women were beseeching mercy from the Almighty, and the children were in tears. The main station house, City Hall, Hibernian Hall, and many other well-known public buildings, including St. Michael's church, were irreparably damaged. Broad street presented a spectacle of the utmost horror. Even women armed with hatchets fought valiantly to rescue the imprisoned unfortunates. Meeting street, from Broad to Hazel, is a wreck, and is lined with the unfortunates. To add to the horror of the scenes many fires broke out and were ineffectually fought by the fire department. The night was made bideous with the groans of the dying, the screams of the wounded and the pair having the prayers of the uninjured. The loss to property is estimated at from \$5,000,-000 to \$8,000,000 in the city of Charleston. Shocks of greater or less severity have been felt up to Sunday night, but nothing so severe as the first. The people are still in mortal fear and have not the courage to re-enter their homes, not knowing what instant the next shock will come.
