PAY YOUR TAXES.

Pay your taxes. You must pay a county tax within two years or you cannot vote. Saturday, October 24, is the last day on which taxes can be paid, if you want to cast your vote. Let there be no delay in this matter. Attend to it at once. Pay your taxes.

DO NOT be deceived by those who say the Tariff is not an issue in the coming State election. It is the great issue as long as the Democratic party is the servant of British Free Traders. They are working for a Free Trade U. S. Senator from Pennsylvania, and that is what Republican defeat in November means. Are you ready to be a party to bring that about?

THE Secretary of the Navy has issued a circular to naval architects asking for designs for two armored vessels. Republicans are not expected to reply. Only Democratic naval architects, if any such exist, are invited by the circular. If none such can be found, we suppose the English will be appealed to. John Roach's experience serves as a lesson for Republican ship builders during this administration.

TIMES have certainly undergone a great change since the beginning of the late war. Miss Amelia Jackson, the daughter of Captain James Jackson, commander of the Alexandria Artillery Company, who killed Colonel Ellsworth, of the New York Zouaves at the very outset of the war, has been appointed to a position in the Patent Office. On the 24th of May, 1861, the Federal forces occupied Alexandria. Colonel Ellsworth entered that city early in the morning. The Confederate flag flying from the Marshall House, kept by Captain Jackson. Young Ellsworth determined to have the flag as a trophy. He went up to the roof, tore down the stars and bars and started back. He was met by Captain Jackson, who poured into him a load of slugs from a double barreled

shotgun, killing him instantly. In another moment, Jackson, too, was dead, with a bullet in his brain, which was fired from a Springfield rifle, in the hands of private, afterward Lieutenant Brownell, of Ellsworth's command.

A TARIFF for revenue means a tariff that will fill our treasury with duties paid on foreign goods, and which empoverishes the nation to the amount of the importation. It destroys the market for our home manufacturers, puts out the fires of our workshops, destroys the value of capital, and takes bread from the mouths of our laboring millions. Instead of protecting it destroys labor, and places our workmen at the mercy of British capitalists.

CANDIDATE BLACK was so confident last week in assuring his friends that he would be the next governor of Pennsylvania that the suspicion is abroad that Chairman Hensel has been filling the general Chauncey's brain with his patent prepared estimates on majorities. Cousin Black should bear in mind that the only way to consider Hensel's estimates is to divide them by three and use the quotient for scouring milk-pans.—*Phila. Press.*

THE Seventh Ward Democrats, of Philadelphia, unite with the First and Sixth wards in demanding the removal of the colored Democrat from the office of the appraiser. They are determined that no colored man shall hold office where they have the power to prevent it. These Democrats are of the class that killed Professor Cato, a few years ago, because he dared to vote after they had notified him if he did they would kill him. If Appraiser Baker removes Carroll, the President ought to remove Appraiser Baker.

THE series of oleomargarine stamps has been completed and they will be supplied to collectors of internal revenue as rapidly as they can be printed. The first of the series of the denomination \$600 is for manufacturers, and bears a picture of the Treasury building. The second stamp of the series intended for packages. It is partly printed on bright green and in the center is a pretty design in black ink representing a farmer and mechanic. The last of the series is the export stamp, which is also printed in green, and bears a medalion representing a magnificent ocean steamer under full headway.

They Must Answer.

Chauncey F. Black and Maxwell Stevenson, the Free Trade candidates for Governor and Congressman-at-Large, have made many speeches since they were nominated, but they have both failed to inform an anxious public whether they favor or oppose the passage of the Tariff Reduction bills before Congress, and which are to be acted upon when Congress re-assembles in December.

A more vital issue was never before the American people, and never were candidates more stubbornly silent. Scott—for the question applies with equal force to you—in favor of or against the Free Trade bills still pending upon the House of Representatives?" You owe it to the people of Pennsylvania if not to your sense of honor, to give a manly, direct and positive reply to this question, a reply that cannot be misunderstood nor misconstrued. And it is thus you must answer.


