The Republican Meeting.

Every seat in the Court Room was filled last Wednesday evening at an early hour, the large audience having gathered to hear the campaign opened by Col. D. H. Hastings, of Bellefonte, the law partner of General James A. Beaver. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Shawkey, and Samuel D. Irwin Esq., was elected President, with a number of Vice Presidents from each township. The Tionesta Brass Band were present, and at the completion of the organization played a lively air. Mr. Irwin then expressed his thanks for the honor conferred on him, and in a happy manner introduced the speaker of the evening, Col. Hastings. The Colonel is a fine looking man and has an equally fine voice as an orator. His speech lasted about an hour and a half, during which the audience were very attentive and listened eagerly to every word that was said. The records of the Republican and Democratic parties were truthfully set forth and contrasted, much to the disparagement of the latter. His glowing tribute to the gallant General Beaver was one of the happy points of his speech. At the finish of Col. Hastings' speech, the President introduced Miles W. Tate Esq., who never fails to please an audience. He kept the house in a good humor during his entire speech, which lasted nearly an hour. Mr. Tate directed his remarks mainly to the third party issue, and showed conclusively that as the Republican party had adopted a plank in its platform to submit a constitutional amendment to a vote of the people, there was no further use for a separate prohibition party. Mr. Tate's address was listened to with marked attention, and received many rounds of applause.

Lieut.-Gov. Stone was loudly called for, but refused to speak. However, the few remarks he made elicited eager attention, and were full of wholesome truths. At the close of the speeches three rousing cheers were given for the ticket, and the audience dispersed amid the happiest feeling. The meeting passed off very pleasantly without the slightest jar or interruption in the proceedings, and was pronounced on every hand to be a very successful one. For the first gun of the campaign the sound was a good one. The band deserves praise for the good music rendered.

Proclamation of General Election.

Whereas, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled 'An Act to regulate the Elections of the Commonwealth,' passed the 2d day of July, A. D., 1880, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within this Commonwealth to give public notice of the General Elections, and in such to enjoin:

1st. The officers to be elected. I, LEONARD AGNEW, High Sheriff of the county of Forest, do hereby make known and give this public notice to the electors of the county of Forest, that a General Election will be held in said county, on

Tuesday, November 2, 1886.

between the hours of 7 a. m. and 7 p. m. at the several Election Districts.

The Electors of Barnett township at Jacob Maze's Carpenter shop.

The Electors of Green township at the house of L. Arner.

The Electors of Harmony township at Alhender School House.

The Electors of Hickory township at the hotel of J. W. Ball.

The Electors of Howe township as follows: Those residing in the Election District of West Howe, to-wit: Those west of the following line, viz: Beginning at the northwest corner of warrant number 3188 and northwest corner of warrant number 2735, and running thence directly south to the Jenks township line, at the Balltown School House.

The Electors of Howe township residing in the Election District of East Howe, to-wit: Those residing east of the above mentioned line, at Brookston, in Brookston Library Hall.

The Electors of Jenks township at the School House in Marien.

The Electors of Kingsley township at Newtown School House.

The Electors of Tionesta township at the Court House in Tionesta borough.

The Electors of Tionesta borough at the Court House in said borough.

At which time and places the qualified electors will elect by ballot:

One person for Governor of Pennsylvania.

One person for Lieutenant Governor of Pennsylvania.

One person for Auditor General of Pennsylvania.

One person for Secretary of Internal Affairs of Pennsylvania.

One person for Congressman-at-Large for the State of Pennsylvania.

One person for Member of Congress for the 25th District of Pennsylvania.

One person for State Senator for the 25th District of Pennsylvania.

One person for Assembly of Forest County.

One person for Treasurer of Forest County.

One person for Surveyor of Forest County.

One person for Coroner of Forest County.

The act of Assembly entitled "An act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth," passed July 2, 1819, provides as follows, viz:

"In case the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend on the day of his election, then the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for Judge at the next preceding election shall act as inspector in his place. And in case the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend, the person elected Judge shall appoint an inspector in his place, and in case the person elected Judge shall not attend, then the inspector who received the highest number of votes shall appoint a Judge in his place; and if any vacancy shall continue in the board for the space of one hour after the time fixed by law for the opening of the election, the qualified voters of the township, ward, or district for which such officer shall have been elected, present at the place of election shall elect one of their number to fill such vacancy."

I also give official notice to the electors of Forest county, that by an act entitled "An Act further supplemental to the act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth," approved Jan. 30, 1874:

Sec. 3. All the elections by the citizens shall be by ballot; every ballot voted shall be numbered in the order in which it shall be received, and the number recorded by the clerks on the list of voters opposite the name of the elector from whom received. And any voter voting two or more tickets, the several tickets so voted shall each be numbered with the number corresponding with the number to the name of the voter. Any elector may write his name upon his ticket, or cause the same to be written thereon, and attested by a citizen of the district, then the person who shall be elected by law to be taken and subscribed by election officers, they shall severally be sworn or affirmed not to disclose how any elector shall have voted, unless required to do so as witnesses in a judicial proceeding. All judges, inspectors, clerks

and overseers of every election hold under their oaths, before entering upon their duties, to be duly sworn or affirmed in the presence of each other. The judge shall be sworn by the minority inspector, if there shall be such minority inspector, if not, then by a justice of the peace or alderman, and the inspectors and clerk shall be sworn by the judge. Certificates of such swearing or affirming shall be duly made out and signed by the officers so sworn, and attested by the officer who administered the oath. If any judge or minority inspector refuses or fails to swear the officers of election in the manner required by this act, or if any officer of election shall act without being duly sworn, or if any officer of election shall certify that any officer was sworn when he was not, it shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, the officer or officers so offending shall be fined not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisoned not exceeding one year, or both, in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 11. It shall be lawful for any qualified citizen of the district, notwithstanding the name of the proposed voter is contained on the list of resident taxpayers, to challenge the vote of such person, whereupon the proof of the right of suffrage as is now required by law shall be publicly made and acted upon by the election board and the vote admitted or rejected, according to the evidence. Every person claiming to be a naturalized citizen shall be required to produce his naturalization certificate at the election before voting, except where he has been for five years consecutively a voter in the district in which he offers to vote; and on the vote of such person being received, it shall be the duty of the election officers to write or stamp on such certificate the word "voted," with the day, month and year; and if any election officer or officers shall receive a second vote on the same day, by virtue of some certificate, except where sons are entitled to vote because of the naturalization of their fathers, they and the person who shall offer such second vote, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, at the discretion of the court; but the fine shall not exceed five hundred dollars in each case, nor the imprisonment one year. The like punishment shall be inflicted on conviction on the officers of election who shall neglect or refuse to make or cause to be made the endorsement required aforesaid on said naturalization certificate.

Sec. 12. If any election officer shall refuse or neglect to require such proof of the right of suffrage as is prescribed by this law, or laws to which this is a supplement, from any person offering to vote whose name is not on this list of assessed voters, or whose right to vote without requiring such proof, every person so offending shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be sentenced for every such offense, to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or to undergo an imprisonment of not more than one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.

I also make known the following provisions of the new Constitution of Pennsylvania:

ARTICLE VIII. SUFFRAGE AND ELECTIONS.

Sec. 1. Every male citizen twenty-one or more years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections:

First.—He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one year.

Second.—He shall have resided in the State one year, (or, if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months,) immediately preceding the election.

Third.—He shall have resided in the election district where he offers to vote at least six months immediately preceding the election.

Fourth.—If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before election.

Sec. 2. The general election shall be held annually on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November, but the General Assembly may, by law, fix a different day, two-thirds of all the members of each House consenting thereto.

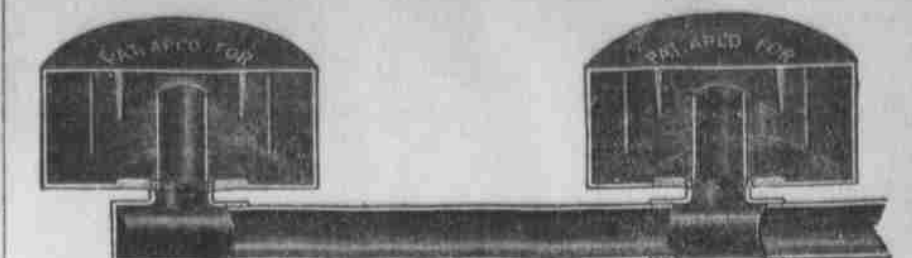
I also give official notice of the following provisions of an act approved the 30th of March, 1886, entitled "An act regulating the mode of voting at all the elections of this Commonwealth."

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth, at all general, township, borough and special elections are hereby permitted and required to vote by tickets printed or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges of courts voted for and shall be labeled "Judiciary"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all the State officers voted for and be labeled "State"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all the county officers voted for, including office of Senator and member of Assembly, if voted for, and be labeled "County"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all the township officers voted for, and be labeled "Township"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all the borough officers voted for and be labeled "Borough"; and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot boxes.

Notice is hereby given, That any person excepting Justices of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, or this State, or any city or incorporated district, whether civil, military or otherwise, or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislative, executive or judiciary department of this State, or in any city, or in any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, or of the select or common council of any city, or commissioner of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of such election shall be eligible to be taken voted for.

The Judges of the aforesaid districts shall representatively take charge of the certificates of return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at the Prothonotary's office in the Borough of Tionesta, as follows: "All Judges living within twelve miles of the Prothonotary's office, or within twenty-four miles if their residence be in a town, village or city upon the line of a railroad leading to the county seat, shall before two o'clock p. m., on WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER THIRD, 1886, and all other Judges shall before twelve o'clock, m., on THURSDAY, NOVEMBER FOURTH, 1886, deliver to the Prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas of Forest county, which said return shall be filed, and the day and hour of filing marked thereon, and shall be preserved by the Prothonotary for public inspection. Given under my hand and my office in Tionesta, Pa. this 27th day of September, 1886, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and in the one hundred and eighteenth year of the Independence of the United States.
