

Whereas, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled 'An Act to regulate the ections of the Commonwealth,' passed the 2d day of July, A. D., 1889, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within this Commonwealth to give public notice of the General Elections, and in such to enumerate:

The act of Assembly entitled "an act re-lating to the elections of this Commonwealth," passed July 2, 1819, provides as follows, viz:

"In case the person who shall have re-ceived the second highest number of votes ceived the second highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend on the day of any election, then the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for Judge at the next preceding election shall act as inspector in his place. And in case the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend, the person elected Judge shall appoint an inspector in his spector shall not attend, the person elected Judge shall appoint an inspector in his place, and in case the person elected Judge shall not attend, then the inspector who received the highest number of votes shall appoint a Judge in his place; and if any vacancy shall continue in the loard for the space of one hour after the time fixed by law for the opening of the election, the qualified voters of the township, ward or district for which such officer shall have been elected, present at the place of election shall elect one of their number to fill such vacancy.

I also give official notice to the electors
of Forest county, that by an act entitled "An Act further supplemental to the act relative to the election of this Common-

wealth, approved Jan. 30, 1874;"
SEC. 9. All the elections by the citizen shall be by ballot; every ballot voted shall be numbered in the order in which it shall be received, and the number recorded by the clerks on the list of voters opposite the name of the elector from whom received. And any voter voting two or more tickets the several tickets so voted shall each be numbered with the number correspo ing with the number to the name of the voter. Any elector may write his name upon his ticket, or cause the same to be written thereon, and attested by a citizen of the district. In addition to the oath now of the district. In addition to the cath now prescribed by law to be taken and subscribed by election officers, they shall severally be sworn or affirmed not to disclose how any elector shall have voted, unless required to do so as witnesses in a judicial proceeding. All judges, inspectors, clerks

and overseers of every election held under this act, shall, before entering upon their duties, be duly sworn or affirmed in the presence of each other. The judge shall be sworn by the unnority inspector, if there shall be such minority inspector, if there shall be such minority inspector, if not, then by a justice of the peace or alderman, and the inspectors and elerk shall be sworn by the judge. Certificates of such swearing or affirming shall be duly made out and signed by the officers so sworn, and attested by the officer who administered the oath. If any judge or minority issue. the oath. If any judge or minority inspector refuses or falls to swear the officers of election in the manner required by this act, or if any officer of election shall act without being duly sworn, or if any officer of election shall certify that any officer was sworn when he was not, it shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, the efficer or officers so offending shall be fined not exceeding one thousand dollars. or imprisoned not exceeding one year, or both, in the discretion of the court. SEC. 11. It shall be lawful for any quali-

fied citizen of the district, notwithstand-ing the name of the proposed voter is con-tained on the list of resident taxables, to challenge the vote of such person, where ohallenge the vote of the person, whereupon the proot of the right of suffrage
as is now required by law shall
be publicly made and acted upon
by the election board and the
vote admitted or rejected, according to the
evidence. Every person claiming to be a
naturalized citizen shall be required to
produce his naturalization certificate at
the election before voting, event where the election before voting, except where he has been for five years consecutively a voter in the district in which he offers to vote; and on the vote of such person being received, it shall be the duty of the election officers to write or stamp on such cortificate the word "voted," with the day, month and year; and if any election offi-cer or officers shall receive a second vote on the same day, by virtue of same cer-tificate, except where sons are entitled to vote because of the naturalization of their fathers, they and the person who shall offer such second vote, shall be guilty of a misdomeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined or imprisoned or both at shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, at the discretion of the court; but the fine shall not exceed five hundred dollars in each case, nor the imprisonment one year. The like punishment shall be inflicted on conviction on the officers of election who shall neglect or refuse to make or cause to be made the endorsement required aforesaid on said naturalization ertificate.

SEC, 12. If any election officer shall re fuse or neglect to require such proof of the right of suffrage as is prescribed by this law, or laws to which this is a supple-ment, from any person offering to vote whose name is not on this list of assessed voters or whose right to vote without revoters, or whose right to vote without requiring such proof, every person so of-ending shall, upon conviction, be suity of a misdemeanor, and shall be sentenced for every such offense, to pay a fine not exceeding five hundred dellars, or to undergo an imprisonment of not more than one year, or both, at the discretion of the

I also make known the following pre-visions of the new Constitution of Peansylvania:

ARTICLE VIII.

SUFFRAGE AND ELECTION. SEC. I. Every male eltizen twenty-or c years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at

all elections:

First.—He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one mouth.

Second.- He shall have resided in the State

one year, (or, if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State he shall have removed thereform and returned, then six months,) imme 'iately preceding the election.

Third.—He shall have resided in the election district where he offers to vote at

least two months immediately preceding the election.

Fourth.—If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before election. SEC. 2. The General election shall be

held annually on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November, but the General Assembly may, by law, fix a different day, two-thirds of all the mem-bers of each House consenting thereto,

I also give official notice of the following provisions of an act approved the 30th of March, 1866, entitled "An act regulating the mode of voting at all the elections of this Commonwealth.

SEC. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Common-wealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same. That the qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth, at all general, township, borough and special elections are hereby hereafter authorized and required to vote by tickets printed or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all Judges of courts voted for and shall be labeled "Judiciary;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all the State officers voted for and be labeled "State;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all the county officers voted for names of all the county officers voted for, including office of Senator and member of Assembly, if voted for, and member of Congress, if voted for, and be labeled "County;" one ticket chall embrace the names of all the township officers voted for, and be labeled "Township;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all the borough officers voted for and be labeled "Borough officers voted for and be labeled "Borough officers and each class shall be done."

"Borough," and each class shall be depos-ited in separate ballot boxes. Notice is hereby given, That any person excepting Justices of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, or this trust under the United States, or this
State, or any city or corporated district,
whether commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who
is or shall be employed under the legisla
ture, executive or judiciary department of
this State, or in any city, or or any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature or of the select or contractions. ture, or of the select or common wouncil of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election in this Common wealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of such election shall be eligi-

ble to be then voted for.


The Judges of the aforesaid districts shall representatively take charge of the certificates of return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at the Prothonotary's office in the Borough of Tionesta, as follows: "All judges living within twelve miles of the Prothenotary's office, or within twenty-four miles if their residence be in a town, village or city upon the line of a railroad village of city toon the line of a railroad leading to the county seat, shall before two o'clock p. m., on WEDNESDAY, NO-VEMBER THIRD, 1886, and all other judges shall before twelve o'clock, m., on THURSDAY, NOVEMBER FOURTH 1886, deliver said returns, together with the return sheets, to the Prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas of Forest county, which said return shall be filed.
