The inauguration of Governor Reaver yesterday was an event worthy of a great state like Pennsylvania. The affair was non-partisan in all respects, Democrats as well as Republicans taking part in the exercises and evidently enjoying them. About 3,000 of the National Guard were present, besides many other organizations and clubs throughout the State. The Governor's inaugural address was delivered in the House of Representatives, and bristled all over with sound doctrine and sensible talk. The Governor announced his cabinet as follows : Secretary of State, Charles W. Stone, of Warren county; Attorney General, Wm. S. Kirkpatrick, of Montgomery county ; Adjutant General, Col. D. H. Hastings, of Centre county ; Private Secretary, George Pearson, of Mercer county, who was elected chief clerk of the House at its organization. All these appointments are conceded to be wise and judicious ones. The new Governor starts out under very favorable auspices.

SENATOR INGALLS, of Kansas, sees a most favorable outlook for the Republicans in 1888, and regards the nomination of Blaine as certian as anything in nature.

GEN. W. B. HAZEN, chief signal officer of the U. S. Army, died sud denly of diabetes at Washington, on Sunday evening. He was the officer who has sent out the daily official weather reports for several years past.

THE House committee on coinage, weights and measures on Thursday took up for consideration the Senate bill providing that after July 1st trade dollars shall be redeemed to the extent of \$500,000 monthly and shall be counted as a part of the monthly purchase of bullion, as now required by the act of 1878. An amendment striking out that portion of the bill requiring the money redeemed to be counted as a part of the monthly purchase of bullion was voted down. Another amendment providing for an extension of six months after the passage of the bill of the time for the redemption was carried. THE Senate committee on pensions Wednesday decided to report favorably to the Senate, with an amendment the hill to equalize pensions paid soldiers who have become, or may become, permanently and totally disabled by reason of any injury received or disease contracted while in the military or naval service of the United States, which bill was introduced by Mr. Cullom at the last session of Congress. The bill provides that such persons shall hereafter receive in lieu of all pensions now paid them by the government the sum of \$72 per month. The amendment to the measure provides that soldiers who, when they enlisted, possessed but a single eye and who were deprived of the use of that through the service, shall be put on the same footing as those who lost both eyes in the service and now receive \$72 per month.

A BILL was passed in the House yesterday, providing that there shall be at the seat of government an executive department to be known as the department of agriculture and labor under the control of a secretary of agriculture and labor and an assistant secretary. There shall be in the department a division which shall be under the charge of a commissioner of labor, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall recieve a salary of five thousand dollars a year. The commissioner shall collect information upon the subject of labor, its relation to capital, the hours of labor, the rate of wages, the cost of production of the articles produced. the earnings of laboring men and women, the means of promoting their material, social, intellectual, and moral prosperity, and the best means to protect life and prevent accident in mines, workshops, factories and other places of industry.
