Whig Hill, January 28-29 B. F. Winans, President, and Ernestine Catlin, Secretary. January 28, evening session only. Music by Prof. Russell and class. Select reading by B. F. Winans. Supt. Hillard made a short and neat address to teachers and patrons. R. Z. Gillespie entertained the audience in his usually good natured manner with some of his experiences at the Normal School and in teaching, and lessons he had gathered therefrom and thereby. Dr. Smith spoke, not many minutes, but earnestly and well, on the need and value of an education. Prof. Russell followed Dr. Smith in an earnest appeal on the same line of thought. Music. The school house was filled with an orderly and appreciative audience.

Morning, January 29. Opening. Primary Geography, by R. Z. Gillespie, followed by Supt. Hillard. Begin at home and go abroad. How to do this. Proper criticisms in Reading Classes. A class drill by Hillard.

Afternoon, Diagramming. Well discussed by the teachers. R. J. Christie took hold of the work on this subject with a will. E. E. Zuendell presented some excellent thoughts in an excellent way in a short talk on Suggestions. How to teach multiplication, was opened by B. F. Winans and R. Z. Gillespie. All the teachers took part in the discussion earnestly. Winans illustrated the old way of teaching the table by leading the Institute in singing it. Winans and Gillespie sang each line as a duet asisted occasionally by Hillard, to the tune of O' Haddam, the whole Institute singing the 5's as a chorus to the tune of Yankee Doodle.

How to teach meaning of words in spelling classes. Pronunciation of Geographical names. How to teach counting. And other questions were discussed. R. Z. Gillespie offered the following resolutions. That it is the sense of the Institute that the Directors of this township, be requested to purchase a Webster's Unabridged Dictionary for each school in the district, and thereby remove one of the known hindrances to the efficiency of the teacher and the welfare of the pupils. That there should be at least two more educational meetings in this township this winter. That one be held at Ross Run, and one at Mayburg. All carried. Teachers present; B. F. Winans, E. Catlin, R. Z. Gillespie, E. E. Zuendell, M. B. Lewis, L. Guenther, K. Guenther, R. J. Christie, Alwa Hoyt, J. E. Hillard.
