FROM THE STATE CAPITOL.

The Legislature has been a very busy ody during the past three weeks, ago at this date. Two hundred is the legislation. People generally, have passage there is undoubted. an idea that when the legislature meets at 11 a. m. and adjourns at 1:00 p. m. the members have an easy time of it the balance of the day. This is a sad mistake. As a rule, every member is placed upon from three to four committees, and as another rule one or an other of his committees is in session when the legislature is not, and the discussions in committees are often quite animated.

One measure has become a law, having received Governor Beaver's signature on Wednesday of this week. It is the Philadelphia Magistrate's bill, and in approving it the Governor is backed up by a sound opinion of the Attorney General, who holds that it is entirely constitutional. Eight other bills have passed the House finally, and been sent to the Senate for concurrence.

One very important measure to the oil regions has been introduced by Mr. Billingsley, and received an affirmative recommendation from the committee. It is the one relating to the piping and storing of oil, and if passed as it now stands, will reduce the prices for such services by pipe lines fully one half. Many think the reductions too sweeping, and fear the bill cannot pass in its present state, but it will stand considerable modification and still prove a boon to the oil country people. And I believe this legislature is made of the right material to pass a hill of this kind.

The Republicans of the Senate redeemed their promise as a party in the passage of the prohibition amendment vesterday morning, and sept the resolation over to the House for concurrence. That body will take it up in its regular order and pass it, just as the Republican platform of last sum mer said it would

Mr. Raudall of Forest, has intraduced a bill, which has received an affirmative recommendation from committee, to "increase the compensation of witnesses for attending court," to one dollar per day. And this is as it should be. The old style of compelling people to leave their work and spend a week at court at 623 cents per weat in the House, and is one of its influential members, especially in committee work, where the effectual bat tles are fought.

A bill has been introduced making the minimum school term of each year six months, and will likely become a law, if the number of petitions in its favor have any effect.

Another matter of very great interest to our county-that is the Repub licans-is the Congressional apportionment. The Senate has reported, and will likely pass the old Macfarlane Bill, vetoed by Governor Pattison, and which buried us under about 6000 of a Democratic majority, but it has many objectionable features, and will hardly pass the House.
