THE Anarchists scared away from Chicago by the arrest and conviction of their comrades are said to have established a colony in San Domingo, to which those left behind are making their way as quietly but expeditiously as possible. We wish San Domingo no bad luck, but are perfectly willing she should take and keep all the Anarchists, Socialists and Nihilists in our country.

A TELEGRAM from Wilmington, Del., reminds us that we are not very far removed from the barbarism of the dark ages, after all. On Saturday ten prisoners, two white and eight colored, were punished at that place by being made to stand, half naked, in the pillory, or subjected to lashes at the whipping post. Delaware should amend her criminal laws and change the form of punishment inflicted to accord with modern ideas.

THE Senatorial fight in New Jersey will probably end this week in the election of the Hon. Wm. Walter Phelps, Member of Congress. The Republicans will vote solidly for him, while Abbott cannot hold the Democrats in line, and the absence of a number of them will enable a bare majority to elect. The contest promises to be a very exciting one, and Trenton is swarming with politicians, great and small, each thinking he may be able to do something for his own side.

THE end of the great strike at New York has come, but its effects will be felt among the strikers for a long time to come. While the longshoremen and others have been ordered to return to work, it is by no means certain they will be taken back by their old employers on their own terms, which are understood to include an advance of twenty-five per cent. and the immediate discharge of all the new men or "scabs" as they term them. A defeated army is never allowed to dictate terms to its conquerors, and it is hardly likely the modest demands of the strikers will be acquiesced in. Should they persist in them, they may find themselves permanently out of situations.

THE Legislature of this State has passed finally the proposition to submit prohibition as an amendment to the State Constitution. Our Senator and Representative voted in the affirmative every time. The bill is now in the hands of Gov. Beaver for his signature. The Republicans have thus fulfilled the promise of their platform. What will the prohibition politicians do now? Accept and vote in its favor when it is submitted to the people? Not much they would. They will pick flaws in the wording of the amendment or some other trifling matter, and then fight it. 'Cause why? The adoption would throw them out of a job. Tidouste News.

THE Republican majority in the legislature of this State has redeemed the party's pledge by passing, pure and simple, the resolution submitting the prohibition amendment to a vote of the people. The Republican party never made a pledge to the people and violated it. It hasn't got that kind of a record, and yet there are scores of insincere political prohibitionists who were hoping and praying that the amendment might fail of passage, simply that their word might be made good. Wolfe went howling all over the State that the pledge meant nothing, but then no considerable number of people ever placed much stock in Wolfe's howlings.

THE Blair Education Bill for the establishment and temporary support of common schools, a measure which recommends itself to every right minded person, is thus referred to in the National Republican: The Blair

bill has been put to sleep in the committee on rules by the distinguished leaders of the Democratic party, Messrs. Carlisle, Randall, and Morrison. The Republican members of the committee, Messrs. Reed and Hiscock, need one Democratic vote to enable them to report the bill back to the House. The National Republican advises the friends of the measure to write, to telegraph, and telephone, and by personal solicitation to let these distinguished Democratic leaders know that they cannot longer deny the will of the people.
