

NOT FAIR - The Times Democrat, under the gauzy signature of "Tax payer," does some very unfair figuring on the cost of County advertising in Forest county. It is a matter confessedly admitting of a chance for decidedly misleading statements, taken advantage of to the fullest extent by the Democrat editor. However, the Democrat's published rates of advertising on one page show that for the county advertising (not counting the dead head work offered "free" as a bait) it would have charged \$144.39, taking the number of inches as charged in Taxpayer's communication. These figures are based on the rate charged on page two of the Democrat. But on page four they have another rate, (and on which basis they figure the cost of the county advertising in Taxpayer's article) under which the "seven inch advertisement" cost ten times "Taxpayer," would cost only about forty dollars, showing a difference of over one hundred dollars in rates between page two and page four of the Democrat. Of course all the rest of the Democrat's article about discounts, etc. refer as much to the above forty dollar rate, as it does to the rate quoted in its article. This is none of our war, and we only chipped in to show how easy it is to knock out fine spun theories of demagoguery. - Tidoute News.

CONGRESS, on Saturday, the 12th inst., passed the trade dollar bill. The bill passed the Senate, and only requires the President's signature to become a law. At passed the bill provides in its first section that for a period of six months after the passage of this act the trade dollar, if not defaced, mutilated or stamped, shall be received at their face value in payment of all dues to the United States, and shall not again be paid out or in any other manner issued. Section two provides that during the above period the trade dollar not mutilated, defaced or stamped, may receive in exchange on presentation of the same at the treasury or any sub-treasury a like amount in value, dollar for dollar, in standard silver dollars, or in subsidiary silver coins, at option of the holder. Section three directs that the trade dollars received by the government in payment of dues or exchange shall not be paid out, but shall be received into standard silver dollars or subsidiary silver coins at the discretion of the Secretary of the Treasury, provided that the silver of the trade dollars received under this act shall not be considered as part of the silver bullion required to be purchased and coined into standard dollars, as required by act of February 28, 1878. Section four repeals all laws authorizing the coinage and issue of trade dollars.

From the testimony already taken it is clear that a lawless mob in Washington county, Texas, carried things with a high hand at the November election. "Hanging and running men out of the county" seem to have been common occurrence, and the fact that riots and irregularities occurred is not denied by anyone. One of the County Commissioners, a colored man found a paper pinned to his saddle, bearing a picture of a shotgun and this warning: "As Republicanism is dead in Washington county, you had better resign and leave the county or you will be killed." Another prominent citizen received the following notification through the post-office: "O. B. Potter, Sir: - We have been waiting for some time for you to arrange your business and leave this county. This is to notify you that if you persist in staying many days longer you will be dealt with in a very severe manner." A Democratic lawyer told the witness that he had assisted another man to dispose of his property, and "had hard work in keeping the mob off until the transaction could be completed." A Republican candidate for the Legislature who thought he should have received 1,000 majority was counted out, and his opponent declared elected by fifty-three majority. Three ballot boxes were destroyed, one polling place was not opened, and at another the Republican tickets were thrown out, while the Republican candidate himself received a note which said: "You are hereby notified to leave the county without further warning." After these disclosures it will be hard to believe anyone's statement that the investigation is an insult to Texas. It is not the investigation, but the outrages which made the investigation necessary which constitutes an insult, and that not to Texas, alone, but to the institutions of the nation.
