The Republican Mayor is elected in Cincinnati by a slender plurality, but all the other candidates on the ticket succeed by about the usual majority, while a dispatch to a Democratic journal ingenuously reports that: "The Democrats had not elected a man in the city anywhere."

Outside of New York and Brooklyn, this State is Republican by 60,000 or more; outside of Hudson county, New Jersey was Republican at the last election; outside of New Haven and Hartford, Connecticut gives a sure Republican plurality and outside of Boston 5,000, Massachusetts is never in doubt; Ohio has never been in dispute except for the vote of a few cities.

The fact that 4,500,000 letters were last year sent to the dead letter office may not generally be known. Upward of 2,500,000 were destroyed, the writers having accidentally or for certain reasons neglected to give a clue to their whereabouts. Of these letters 17,385 contained money, 20,350 drafts, 34,400 receipts, paid notes, etc., and 85,000 postage stamps.

The Interstate Commission has [not acted a day too soon in suspending the long and short haul clause as far as it applies to the Southern railroads. Laws of trade stronger than any which Congress can pass settle the rates between competitive points, and unless the commission can extend its suspension to the traffic of all the great systems until it is clear at what points the suspension must be permanent and trade adjust itself to new conditions, grave injury to the business of the country must follow as a result of the law.—Philadelphia Press.
