THE New York Sun yesterday stated with much emphasis that Grover Cleveland would not be a candidate for re-election. This is certainly great news. It comes, too, at a very awkward time, just as the Democrats of Kentucky had fairly launched the President for another trip, and with the endorsement of Colonel Henry Watterson, who says that "the President stands with Mr. Carlisle, Mr. Morrison and other revenue reformers," and that "he did all he could to carry the Morrison bill in the last Congress, and will do all he can to secure revenue reform in the next." Perhaps our esteemed New York contemporary has some information not accessible to the general public, but with the President solid with the Southern Free-traders it is not easy to see how the Democracy of the North is going to resist any demands which the South may make. It is possible the people of the South are not so warmly for Cleveland, but the politicians are for him. He satisfies their Free-trade notions, and has thereby secured the endorsement of the great Free-trade Democracy of Kentucky, and he has given the Southern politicians an unexampled number of important offices. Why shouldn't they demand the renomination of Cleveland, even if the whole party in the North should oppose him?—Phila. Press.

Republican Primary Election.

Pursuant to a Resolution of the County Committee, passed May 17th, it is ordered that the Republican voters of Forest meet on SATURDAY, JUNE 25, 1887, at 2 o'clock p. m., at the following named places of holding Primary Elections, to-wit:

Harmony, Lower, Allender School House. Harmony, at West Hickory. Hickory, at East Hickory. Jenks, East, Byron's. Jenks, Central, Marienville. Jenks, Southern, Gilfoyle. Kingsley, Starr, Wm. B. Heath's. Kingsley, Newtown. Howe, East, Brookston. Lowe, West, Balltown. Howe, Middle, Cooper Tract. Tionesta, Court House. Borough, Court House. At which time and places they will by their votes nominate:— One person for Prothonotary. One person for Sheriff. Two persons for County Commissioners. One person for Jury Commissioner. Two persons for Auditors. One person for Representative Delegate.

Each Election precinct will also elect one person for Member of the County Committee for the ensuing year.

The polls will remain open until 7 p. m.

Return Judges will convene at the Court House, Tionesta Borough, on the following Tuesday, June 28, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Attention is called to the Act of June, 1881, regulating Primary Elections, that Judges and Clerks, before entering upon the discharge of their duties shall take and subscribe an oath or affirmation in presence of each other, viz:

"I do (affirm or solemnly swear) that I will as Judge, Inspector or Clerk (as the case may be) at the ensuing election impartially and faithfully perform my duties in accordance with the laws and constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the Republican party of the County of Forest, for the government of said primary elections, meeting or caucus, to the best of my judgment and ability."

This oath or affirmation to be first administered to the Judge by an Inspector, then the Judge can qualify the other officers or administer the oath to any elector offering to vote. The above form is given for convenience and is that prescribed by the Act aforesaid. And all boards will observe it closely, that the election may be conducted according to Rules of the Republican party in this County, and law governing primaries.
