CALL FOR THE REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

HEADQUARTERS REPUBLICAN STATE COMMITTEE, PHILADELPHIA, June 2, 1887. The Republican State Convention will be held in the Opera House, at Harrisburg, on the 13th Wednesday of August, the 17th, 1887, at 10 o'clock, a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for State Treasurer and Judge of the Supreme Court, and for the transaction of other business.

The attention of Republicans throughout the State is respectfully directed to the following Permanent Rules for the holding of State Conventions and the conduct of the party.

First, That Delegates to the State Convention shall be chosen in the manner in which candidates for the General Assembly are nominated.

Second, Hereafter the State Conventions of the Republican Party shall be held not earlier than the third Wednesday of August, except in the year of the Presidential election, when it shall be held not more than thirty days previous to the day fixed for the National Convention, and except in gubernatorial years, at least sixty days' notice shall be given of the date of the State Convention.

Third, That we recommend to the county organizations, that in their rules they allow the largest freedom in the general participation in the primaries consistent with the preservation of the party organization.

The State Convention of June 30th, 1886, having abolished Senatorial representation, Delegates to the approaching State Convention will be selected according to the number of Representatives in the Legislature to which each county or city is entitled under the Representative Act, and the law passed at the recent session of the Legislature.

WHOLE TOWN BURNED. North Clarendon in Ruins.

A most destructive fire that ever broke out in North Clarendon, on the P. & E. R. R., in the night of the 10th inst., out of a total of 100 buildings, only 10 remained, and upward of 1,000 people were homeless. The fire broke out simultaneously in the mill and in the town, and was caused by a spark from a passing train. The fire was extinguished by T. J. Mahoney, and the loss was estimated at \$100,000.

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was fast being destroyed. Appeals for aid were sent to Warren, and the entire fire department of that place responded, reaching the scene at midnight. Work was begun in earnest, but the fire had attained too strong a hold and nothing could be done but to prevent the fire from spreading. Even in this their attempts were ineffectual, and men, women and children rushed into the streets in their night clothing, having been unable to save anything. From midnight until three o'clock in the morning the town continued to burn, and finally with the dying breeze it expired, having nothing more to burn. The town is entirely destroyed with the exception of the railroad depot and thirteen houses on the side of a hill too high for the fire to reach. The loss is estimated at more than \$300,000, while the insurance is less than \$100,000, mostly held by those who could afford to lose. The reason there was so little insurance is that the rates ranged from 7 to 10 per cent. Hundreds of the sufferers lost every dollar they had in the world, and are to-day homeless and penniless. The citizens of Warren have responded to the calls for aid most nobly, having subscribed in money alone nearly \$5,000, to say nothing of the clothing, food, etc., sent in. Oil City also did well, raising in a very short time over \$1,300. Other oil towns have done nobly in this direction. It is not likely the town will be rebuilt. T. J. Mahoney, in whose hotel one of the fires broke out, was arrested for the crime of setting fire to his building, he having made a threat a few days previous that he would do so if the court refused to grant him a license. Mahoney is now under heavy bail.

Fortunately but one fatality occurred during this terrible destruction. W. C. McCutcheon, who worked bravely to save the goods of his friends, was so badly burned that he died the second day after the fire. He leaves a wife and six children.

Later—Mahoney had a hearing in Warren yesterday, and was bound over to court in the sum of \$3,000. The evidence against him was entirely circumstantial.

Cullings. Dr. Gibson, the well-known physician of Jamestown, Pa., is so sick that his life is despaired of. He has just completed a \$60,000 monument for himself. Later—Dr. Gibson died on Monday, aged 74 years.

Wednesday afternoon, June 20, George Patch, an old resident of Warren county, was killed at Irvinville by being struck by mail train east on the P. & E. road. Mr. Patch was nearly 60 years old, and was a widower, but has two sons engaged in business.

Mr. Stein, of Kittanning, contemplating a visit to Germany, sent \$650 to his own address at a German City. When he got there and called for the money, he found that a cousin of his, bearing the same name, had lifted the money and spent the most of it in treating his friends, who congratulated him upon his good luck in getting a fortune from America.

At Clarion on Tuesday of last week Bird W. Greenlaud, aged 17 years, son of Major W. W. Greenland, accidentally shot himself with a self-cocking revolver. In attempting to draw the revolver from his pocket to shoot at a bird the weapon caught in his suspender and was discharged, the ball entering the left groin. He lingered until Thursday last, when he died in great pain. The young man was very popular with all who knew him.

The Steam on Both Wheels! By Rev. Theodore L. Cuyler, Pastor of Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church, Brooklyn.

It requires two wheels to propel a ferry-boat. If one is clogged the boat simply revolves in the water without progress. Every cart needs two wheels, and if one is off the cart capsizes. Our temperance reform depends for its success on both legal suppression of dram-shops and on moral and religious efforts to dissuade people from drinking liquor. If either wheel is off the reform capsizes.

This simple, elementary truth finds fresh confirmation every day. In one of the most thrifty towns of North Carolina local prohibition has been in force for three or four years. The people voted heartily under their excellent "local-option" or local suppression law that no saloons should be licensed. None have been; the letter of the law has been well enforced. Yet there has been no little hard drinking and drunkenness in that town. How so? Some thirsty tipplers brought it beyond the town limits and brought it home in their jugs, and thus evaded the law. Worse yet, two rival druggists laid in a large stock of "liquid damnation," and have peddled it out over their counters as "medicine."

The tapers go to the apothecary-shop, and then, in addition to lying about their health, or carrying a lie from their doctor, they take home the wine or the Bourbon and get drunk on it. To get rid of the temptations, the idle habits, and the corruption of the open saloons is a great benefit indeed. But the primary purpose of the temperance reform is to stop liquor-drinking and drunkenness. If the people of that or any other town either import their own liquors or get them by falsehood at drug-stores or "town agencies," the mischief and the misery of the intoxicating cup are not ended. The method of obtaining the liquor is changed; that's all.

Now, in such a town as the one we are describing, there is just as much need of moral efforts in the churches, schools, and families to uproot the drinking habits as if no prohibitory law existed. The legal-suppression wheel has been driven for all that it is worth, and well driven; yet the cart has capsized.

God never means to let Christian people, or parents, or teachers shirk their bounden duties with impunity, and turn over the whole sin of bottle-worship to the hands of magistrates and policemen—no more than He intends that all licentiousness and theft and gambling shall be left to the civil authorities to suppress, while church and school and home fail to teach the Seventh and Eighth Commandments.

We are radicals, and go for the root as well as the trunk and the branches of the devil's upas. Any man who opposes the sale of intoxicants in the saloons, and yet buys wines, ales, and brandies for his own table, is playing into the hands of the enemy. Prohibition and total abstinence stand or fall together.

A zealous political prohibitionist said to me lately: "What is the use of your total-abstinence sermons, and temperance Sunday-school books, and tracts, and pledges? Clean out the saloons and the evil is done with." Good friend, without moral efforts you will not be able to "clean out the saloons;" and if you did people will get their intoxicants elsewhere, unless you can give them a total-abstinence conscience to let the accursed stuff alone. The evil is not "done with" while the drinking usages with open mouth cry out for the bottle!

Push on the temperance meeting. Push on the temperance literature in every shape. Push on the pledges of entire abstinence. Push on the fight for prohibition at the same time. Let the steam on both wheels! We want law, and love also; persuasion is not to drink liquor. Shutting saloons is not all; we must smash the jugs also.

We want hundreds more fiery-tongued advocates of total abstinence and saloon suppression. Peace with each other, brethren and sisters! But war to the hilt against the bottle everywhere!
