CALL FOR THE REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

HEADQUARTERS REPUBLICAN STATE COMMITTEE. PHILADELPHIA, June 9, 1887. The Republican State Convention will be held at the Opera House, at Harrisburg, on the third Wednesday of August, the 17th, 1887, at 10 o'clock, a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for State Treasurer and Judge of the Supreme Court, and for the transaction of other business.

A Presidential Canvass.

The Presidential canvass made by the Toledo Blade and published in The Press of yesterday doubtless fairly reflects the general Republican sentiment. The paper has no strong personal bias which would influence its readers. The responses came from all sections and all States.

This canvass emphasizes, what was already well understood, that Mr. Blaine is the favorite of the great mass of Republicans and that Senator Sherman stands second. The preference between these two eminent leaders in the proportion of two to one. Other conspicuous men like Lincoln, Allison, Harrison and Hawley—some of whom would make eligible candidates, receive a few scattering votes, but the thought of Republicans centres chiefly in the two able statesmen who confidently tower above all others.

One of the most interesting features of the canvass is the fact that even in Ohio Mr. Blaine slightly leads Mr. Sherman. The attempt has been made in some quarters to embroil the friends of Mr. Blaine and those of Mr. Sherman in Ohio in an unessentially and unfortunate conflict. This effort finds no prompting or sanction outside of the State. No friend of Mr. Blaine beyond the borders of Ohio would assume to meddle with its internal politics, and least of all would seek to excite any opposition to Mr. Sherman in his own State. The true policy and the sincere feeling of Republicans who have the best interests of the party at heart is to promote mutual consideration and deference. Mr. Blaine and Mr. Sherman are themselves the best of friends, and their cordial regard and considerate bearing toward each other constitute a worthy example for all others.

But this canvass discloses that the Republicans of Ohio are themselves about evenly divided in their preferences. It is not an expression of the politicians but of the people, and it explains whatever of rivalry has appeared in the preliminary meetings and the county conventions. If the preference of the Republicans is strong enough to impel them to this expression, it is strong enough to guide them in the forms of political action. The Republicans of Ohio must answer for themselves.—Phila. Press.

Some Cures for "Snake Bites."

I notice in your last issue the request of Mrs. C. Hall for some reliable "Cure for Snake-Bites," other than the one in common use. I am glad to be able to name at least three or four, either of which I should sooner risk than the one in question; and most of which are within all our homes, or in the poultry yard.

First, common turpentine, applied as quickly as possible after the accident. Mode of application: Where you have a large-necked bottle, put in as much as it will hold, and place the unopened mouth immediately over the wound, and hold the bottle on so closely that but little if any of the liquid can escape. In a very few seconds the contents of the bottle will be colored with the virus drawn from the wound. After a few minutes empty the bottle, and after refilling, apply again. When a bottle cannot be had, let the wound be kept well soaked with turpentine, by using a large piece of cotton cloth well saturated, and changing the cloth every two or three minutes.

Second, a very strong solution of soda, applied in the same way as the turpentine, when turpentine is not on hand. Also let the patient have strong soda water to drink freely.

Third, (and I am not sure but first in efficiency,) I call attention to the chicken or fowl remedy. Let any fowl (a dog, cat or pig would no doubt answer as well) be killed, and cut in pieces instantly, and a large piece of the bird or animal, be applied to and bound upon the wound while the flesh is still warm. In two or three minutes let this be removed, as it becomes colored with the extracted virus, and another piece be substituted in its place.

Fourth, ammonia, or "spirits of hartshorn," applied in the same way as the turpentine or solution of soda. As well read a physician, I think, as any I know, assured me, a few years ago, that while whisky is not, in reality, an antidote to snake-bite poison, that ammonia is. The fact, he said, that the former sometimes figures in the cure of a poisonous bite, was not owing to its being an antidote per se, for such it is not. But the only benefit that came from its use was a sort of arrest of the further progress of the poison through the system, until nature could throw it off, and thus sometimes (but not always) proves a help, until Nature resumes her normal functions, while in case of the remedies mentioned in this article, the poison is at once eliminated from the system.

In case the accident occurs some distance from a house, and where neither of these four articles can be had, let either or both of the following expedients be temporarily adopted: First, the poison be drawn from the wound with the patient's own mouth, if he can reach the bitten part, or by another, if he is not alone. Or if mud can be found, or water with which to make some mud, let a good sized mud poultice be applied to and kept firmly on the bitten place, until one of the remedies above described can be applied.
