

THAT SILK BANNER.

A Harrisburg dispatch of the 23d inst., says a complete table of the vote for President in 1884 and the vote for State Treasurer in 1887, and also the percentage which the latter is of the former in each county of the State, show that Forest leads with 101.9.

Chairman Cooper and Secretary Leach, of the Republican State Committee, were at the Continental Hotel on Wednesday night, says the Philadelphia Press, and talked over some of the figures of the late election.

And why two banners? The result between Crawford and Forest is not a tie by any means, and is very easily determined; furthermore the determination will give Forest county the banner by several points, and we will allow Crawford to figure it her own way and then beat her fully one per cent.

It is said that Forest County will capture the banner. Well, that pleases us nearly as much as though it came to McKean county.

Forest County got Cooper's silk banner for exceeding the Blaine vote by 14. The Blaine vote in Forest was 705 and the Hart vote 719.

Strange as it may seem, the smallest county in the State will capture the banner offered by Chairman Cooper to the county which this year cast a Republican vote nearest that given to Blaine in 1884.

One of the curious features of the late election in Pennsylvania is the fact that the only county in which the Republicans cast as many votes as were given Blaine in 1884 is Forest, which at the last census was the smallest county in point of population.

There is going to be a dispute between Crawford and Forest Counties as to which shall have the banner offered by the Republican State Committee for the nearest relative approach to the Blaine vote of 1884.

on a total Republican vote of 716. Both counties have done nobly, and if Chairman Cooper concludes to give each a banner no harm will be done.

A dispatch from Harrisburg says the beautiful silk banner which Chairman Cooper, of the Republican State Committee, promised to the county making the best showing as compared to the vote cast for Blaine, will probably be awarded to Forest, which polled 14 votes more for Hart than for Blaine.

THE matter of electing delegates to the next Republican National Convention is being agitated in Philadelphia.

The feeling above referred to has not spread to any appreciable extent among the voters of the land, who are stronger in favor of Blaine to day than ever.

THE Republican National Committee will meet within two weeks to determine the time and place of the National Convention. The choice of place will undoubtedly lie between Chicago and Philadelphia.

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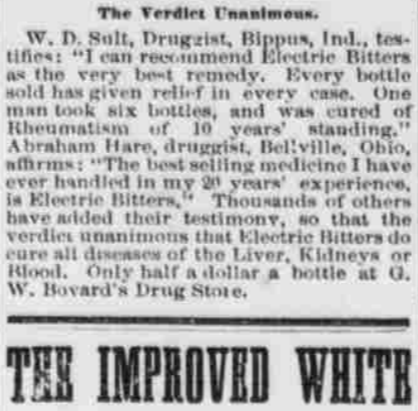
