—Shadrach V. Bedikian, from Constantinople, Turkey, a student at Washington and Jefferson college, Washington, Pa., will lecture at the M. E. Church on Friday evening, Aug. 10th, on the manners and customs of the Turkish people. He will be dressed in his native costume, and illustrate his lecture with Turkish relics. —The State Weather Crop Bulletin for the past week says, the temperature has been about or slightly above the average, with a large amount of sunshine. The rainfall is generally below the average, and has been very unevenly distributed. The weather conditions have continued very favorable for harvesting and for all growing crops. Oat harvest generally finished. Corn and potatoes doing exceedingly well. Ploughing for fall seeding going on rapidly. Rain needed in some sections.

—The County Commissioners met on Wednesday of last week and opened the bids for the new water closets, sewerage, &c., connected with the county buildings. Bids were received and contracts let separately as follows: For drilling the well, to John Grubbs, at \$1.25 per foot. Excavating and doing stone work, Patrick Joyce, at \$217.45. For doing the brick work, plastering and carpenter work, Jas. G. Carson was the lowest bidder, but as there are some changes to be made, the contract was not signed for this work at this time. For putting on tin roof, conductors, cornice, painting, putting in closets, plumbing, furnace, sewerage to Allegheny river, wind engine, derrick and pump, W. H. Pickett & Co.'s of Warren, was the lower bid, \$1,030, and they received the contract. Work on the foundation has already begun, and when completed the new system will be a credit to the county. J. M. Huff was the lowest bidder for rip rapping the approach to the Maple Creek bridge, and received the contract at \$725.

—The Free Methodist camp meeting now in progress at Bleakley's Park, Franklin, is said to be the largest gathering of the kind ever held in this section by that denomination. From the News of last Saturday we call the following account: "The ground is dotted with white tents, fifty-three in number, and all the tents are occupied. Thirteen more tents arrived yesterday, and were rented as fast as they could be pitched. Beautiful for situation is this encampment, commanding a sweeping view of the valley of Franklin and environs, and enjoying pure, refreshing air and the best of water. The surface of the well-shaded park is of such a nature that it keeps dry, shedding the rain as fast as it falls and becoming dry as soon as a shower is over. Neatly arranged tents, supplied with the conveniences of light and fuel, make the camp a comfortable and delightful forest home, and the campers take solid comfort in their convenient retreat. Rev. R. W. Hawkins, Presiding Elder, and Rev. Mr. Hart, of Jamestown, N. Y., are the most prominent ministers on the ground. There is a large tabernacle tent up, in which prayer and special meetings will be held daily. Quite a large delegation arrived from Forest county last evening, and another delegation arrived at 12:45 to-day."

Aug. 6. BROOM HANDLE.

Capt. Stow Post, 274, G. A. R.

TIONESTA, PA., August 1, 1888. Post assembled, S. D. Irwin, Commander, in the chair. Dispensation was read giving power to the Commander to reinstate members on the same evening they applied, dispensation to remain in full force until Nov. 1, next.

The circular of the North Western Association was read and approved. This reunion will take place at Bradford, on Wednesday, August 22, and the committee to ascertain the railroad fare and report. The fare from Tionesta will be one fare one way, or \$2.41 for the round trip. Comrade O'Flaherty of Oil City, on the committee on transportation, under date of August 6, says he expects to secure rates for special train for the benefit of comrades residing in the Allegheny valley above Oil City, and if the rates can be still further reduced will inform the Post.

Comrade Isaac N. Shimp was reinstated at this meeting.

The Post then went into a committee of the whole on the subject of the meeting at Bradford on August 22. A motion was made to go as a Post to Bradford, and it was recommended by Capt. Knox, Black and others, that they go in uniform as far as possible, and endeavor at least to procure caps as far as possible, and arriving at Bradford, to keep together as a Post; which resolution was carried.

The Post elected Representatives to the N. W. A. as follows: Past Com' D. S. Knox, G. W. Bovard.

A motion was made and carried to invite the Tionesta Cornet Band and Post Band to go with us to Bradford, provided the members pay their own expenses. It was regretted that the Post funds were insufficient to pay their fare to Bradford, and it was recommended that the citizens contribute to this worthy object.

On motion of Daniel Black it was resolved that Nick Thompson Camp of Sons of Veterans be also invited to go with us on this memorable occasion.

A circular of the Bradford Era was read, asking comrades to send in stories and sketches of army life, &c., for publication in a mammoth sheet of that paper to be published on August 23, the day after the reunion, and send in a roster of the Post, which was done.

The following committee was appointed concerning the tombstone or to investigate the burial place of Comrade Turner in Howe twp., who was killed in the woods a number of years ago in Howe twp., and consider the removal of his remains to some cemetery. Remarks were made by Knox, Parsons, Black, Caulfield, Rhodes and others, after which the Commander appointed D. Black, D. S. Knox and J. J. Parsons a committee to report at some future meeting.

A resolution was then passed that the newspapers of Forest county be requested to publish these proceedings.
