This industry gives steady employment to five men, and, although there is but a small profit in them for the firm, it will be kept up so as to give those five men work. This firm pays good wages to their men, besides interesting themselves in their welfare. There is a company store at Stowtown, but the men are at liberty to trade where they wish, and none of the customary restraints of
