A member named Kreps from Franklin Co. has introduced a bill debarbing all beneficial insurance organizations from operating in this State further than to pay \$300 for funeral expenses at death, or a stated sum of money during disability.

A BILL has been introduced in the Legislature at the instance of auditor-General McCamant, providing for the payment of fixed salaries to associate judges not learned in the law, of which there are two each in the counties of Adams, Bedford, Cameron, Carbon, Centre, Clarion, Columbia, Elk, Forest, Fulton, Green, Huntingdon, Jefferson, Juniata, Lawrence, Lebanon, McKean, Mifflin, Monroe, Montour, Perry, Pike, Potter, Snyder, Somerset, Sullivan, Union, Washington, Wayne and Wyoming.

A New General Road Bill. Senator McLain, of Washington County, will introduce a general road law. It provides that at the February election of 1890 three road commissioners shall be elected in each township in each county of the State, to serve one, two and three years respectively.
