The well is 280 feet higher than the river bank, and found its oil at 713 feet, being a saud 27 feet above the second sand. The sand so called is a slaty truck with very little oil, sand or pebble in it. The oil is a beautiful amber oil, and looks like the second sand oil found on the Shaw farm, on the Plumer road.
