Tragedy of a Gas Well.

The following dispatch from Litchfield, Ill., under date of Feb. 17, is going the rounds, the Mr. Varner in question being a former citizen of Tionesta :

mystery was solved here yesterday at 10 o'clock. While Sam Varner, head driller for the Litchfield Natural Gas Company, was at work at a well on the Potts farm, about a mile and a half from the town on the Mount Olive road, the drill got stuck and refused to respond to the efforts of the machinery to raise it. The drill is composed of a large bar of steel, weighing about half a top, and is drawn up by a windlass, then dropped sometimes as much as 50 feet. Mr. Varner worked for nearly au hour before he could get the drill free, and he then brought it to the surface, to make an examination. As it came to

view he was astonished to discover that it was covered with blood, as was the rope for several feet above the drill. Late in the evening the mystery was explained by the presentation of the following bill by the Litchfield Coal Company :




