Charged With a Daring Robbery.

On Monday of this week Sheriff Sawyer arrested Adam Ruth at the instance of Detective Hall of Oil City, who had a warrant for him charging him with the brutal assault and robbery of an old and inoffensive gentleman, living in the vicinity of Oil City, on Monday of last week.

The prisoner was taken in charge and conveyed to that city yesterday. The following from the Derrick of Tuesday of last week gives the particulars of the robbery of which Ruth is charged:

A well known character, who is frequently seen on our streets, Jakey Adamo, of Italian nationality, and aged about 60 years, who lives alone in a little ranch a short distance up Charley Run, came into town yesterday a little after 12 o'clock and reported that he had been brutally assaulted and robbed by an unknown young man about 21 or 22 years of age. The old man presented a pitiful appearance, indeed. He had received three or four scalp wounds, from which the blood was flowing freely over his clothes and beard. In broken language the following statement was made by him: "I was in the house attending to some work, when a young man came in and said that he was a detective, whose business it was to unearth and bring to justice all counterfeiters in this section of the State, and as I (Adamo) had been under suspicion for some time as being a member of a gang of counterfeiters, he had come to arrest me, to which, of course, I was much surprised, but replied that I was perfectly willing to accompany the officer to the Mayor's office for a hearing. When I sat down on a chair to put on my shoes, the rascal took the most cowardly advantage of me by beating me on the head with an ax handle, after which he fastened my hands behind my back with a strap and then robbed me of about \$25 in cash." This, in brief, is the old man's statement, and the circumstances in reference thereto are strange as the assault and robbery were made in broad daylight. Soon after the occurrence, a young man answering the description given by the old man, was seen running up the railroad track, by several reliable parties. The next seen of him was at Morgan's store where he purchased some cigars, from thence he went up Spring street in the direction of Siverlyville.

This morning's Derrick gives the following particulars of the hearing: "At the hearing yesterday afternoon before Esquire Reynolds, the prisoner was identified by Jacob Adamo, Captain Hathaway, Henry Brown and his two sons as being the same person who slept at the home of the latter the night before his visit to Captain Hathaway and his subsequent assault on and robbery of old man Adamo. At the hearing the prisoner pleaded innocent of the charges preferred against him, and waived a hearing. Later in the day he was taken to the Nursery and lodged in the county jail to await a further trial."
