An act to punish bribery at certain elections, approved May 9th, 1889, provides that any person who shall give or promise or offer to give to an elector any money, reward, or other valuable consideration for his vote at any election held for the purpose of voting on an amendment to the constitution or any other public purpose, or for withholding the same, or who shall give or promise to give such consideration to any other person or party for such electors vote, or for the withholding thereof, and any elector who shall receive or agree to receive for himself or for another any money, reward, or other valuable consideration for his vote at such election, or for withholding the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon convicton thereof shall pay a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, and undergo imrisonment not exceeding one year.

whose name is not on this list of assessed voters, or whose right to vote without requiring sinch proof, every person so offending shall, upon conviction, be utilty of a missicureanor, and shall be sentenced for every such offense, to pay a fine not exceeding five humared dollars, or to undergo an imprisonment of not more than one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.

I also make known the following provisions of the new Constitution of Peans sylvania;

ARTICLE VIII.

SEC. I. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be outified to vote at

least two months immediately preceding the election The election.

Fourth.—If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before election.

Notice is hereby given, That any person-excepting Justices of the Peace who shall excepting Justices of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, or this State, or any city or corporated district, whether commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislature, executive or judiciary department of this State, or in any city, or of any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, or of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of such election shall be eligible to be then yould for.

the rollicer of such election shall be eligible to be then yoted for.

The Judges of the aforesaid districts shall representatively take charge of the certificates of return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at the Prothenotary's office in the Borough of Tiongsta, as follows: "All judges living within twelve miles of the Prothenotary's office or within tweeter. Borough of Rionesta, as follows: "All judges living within twelve miles of the Prothonotary's office, or within twenty-four miles if their residence be in a town, village or city years the line of a nallroad leading to the county seat, shall before two o'clock p. m., on WEDNESDAY, JUNE NINETEENTH, 1889, and all other judges shall before twelve o'clock, m., on THURSDAY, JUNE TWENTHITH, LS9, deliver said returns, together with the return sheets, to the Prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleus of Forest county, which said return shall be filed, and the day and hour of filing marked therein, and shall be preserved by the Prothonotary for public inspection.
