Joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of this Commonwealth. SECTION I. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in Gen-

eral Assembly met, That the following amendment is proposed to the Coastitu-tion of the Commonwealth of Pennsylva-nia, in accordance with the Eighteenth Article thereof:

Article thereof:

AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said Constitution to be designated as Article XIX, as follows:

ARTICLE XIX.

The manufacture, sale, or keeping for sale of intoxicating liquor, to be used as a beverage, is hereby prohibited, and any violation of this prohibition shall be a misdemeanor, punishable as shall be provided by law.

The manufacture, sale, or keeping for sale of intoxicating liquor for other pursule of the p

sale of intoxicating liquor for other pur-poses than as a beverage may be allowed in such manner only as may be prescribed by law. The General Assembly shall, at the first session succeeding the adoption of this article of the Constitution, enact laws with adequate penalties for its en-forcement.

Joint resolution proposing an amend-ment to the constitution of the commonwealth:
Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met That the following is proposed as an amendment to the constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof:

Strike out from section one, of article

Strike out from section one, of article eight, the four qualifications for voters which reads as follows:

"If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid, within two years, a state or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months, and paid at least one month before the election," so that the section which reads as follows:
"Every male citizen twenty-one years." "Every male citizen, twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifi-cations, shall be entitled to vote at all First. He shall have been a citizen of

the United States at least one month.

Second. He shall have resided in the state one year (or if, having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the state, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months) immediately preceding the election. immediately preceding the election.

Third. He shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election.

preceding the election.

Fourth, If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid, within two years, a state or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election," shall be amended, so as to read as follows:

Every male citizen twenty-one years of

age, possessing the following qualifica-tions, shall be entitled to vote at the pell-ing place of the election district of which he shall at the time be a resident and not

cisewhere;
First, He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least thirty days.
Second. He shall have resided in the state one year (or if, having previously been a qualified elector or native born cit-izen of the state, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months) imme liately preceding the election.

Third. He shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to

vote at least thirty days immediately

preceding the election. The legislature, at the session thereof next after the adeption of this section, shall, and from time to time thereafter may, enact laws to properly enforce this provision.

Fourth. Every male citizen of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a citizen for thirty days and an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding an election, except at municipal elections, and for the last thirty days a resident of the election district in which he may offer his vote, shall be entitled to vote at such election in the election district of which he shall at the time be a resident and not elsewhere for all officers that now are or hereafter may be elected by the people: Provided, That in time of war no elector in the actual military service of the State or of the United States, in the army or navy thereof, shall be deprived of his vote by reason of his absence from such election district, and the legislature shall have power to provide the manner in which and the time and place at which such

absent electors may vote, and for the re-turn and canvas of their votes in the election district in which they respectively election district in which they respectively reside.

Fifth, For the purpose of voting, no person shall be deemed to have gained or lost a residence by reason of his presence or absence while employed in the service of the United States or the State, nor while engaged in the navigation of the waters of the State or of the high seas, nor while student of any college or seminary of learning, nor while kept at any almshouse or public institution, except the inmates of any home for disabled and indigent soldiers and sailors, who, far the purpose of voting, shall be deemed to reside in the election district where said home is located, Laws shall be made for ascertaining, by proper proofs, the citizens who shall be entitled to the right of suffrago hereby established."
