Thomas Haggerty and Sheldon Wilson, the two men who are now serving sentences for the desperate attempt to rob the Wagners two years ago, were brought here yesterday from the penitentiary to testify on the part of the Commonwealth in the case against Aquilla and Sic. Mong as being parties to that crime. Deputy Carson of this county, and two prison officials accompanied the prisoners, who attracted a large crowd as they were conveyed from the depot and deposited in the county bastille. The case will come up this week and is attracting much interest.

Court Minutes.

Court convened Monday at 2 o'clock p. m., with Judge Brown and Associates Arner and Propper on the bench.

The afternoon was mostly taken up with routine work, hearing constables' returns, charging the grand jury, &c.

Tuesday morning the case against Charles Morphy indicted for keeping a gambling house, was called. The defendant pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$10, costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment in the county jail of five days.

Next came the case of Barney Martin, indicted for selling liquor without a license. Barney had procured no counsel, and informed the Court that he did not want any. He denied the charge, and proceeded to conduct his own defense. One witness was sworn, who said he had at one time procured a bottle of whiskey from Barney, agreeing to pay him for it, but had never done so. With this evidence the case went to the jury, which after a few minutes' deliberation brought in a verdict of not guilty.

The Commonwealth vs. John Carbaugh was the next case called. The defendant was indicted for fornication and bastardy, to which charge he pleaded guilty, whereupon the Court sentenced him to pay a fine of \$10 to the county, costs of prosecution, \$20 lying in expenses to the prosecutrix, and to pay the sum of \$1.25 per week for the term of three years for the maintenance of the child.

Case of the Commonwealth for the use of Jennie E. Bradish vs. R. W. Bradish and Wm. Bradish was then called. This was a case to recover on a bond given for the support of plaintiff by her husband, R. W. Bradish. The Court ordered that the verdict be in favor of the plaintiff in the sum of \$300.

There being no other criminal business ready for trial the case of Robt. McCloskey and A. B. Reed vs. J. H. Rider and Jerome Powell was put on trial, and is now occupying the attention of the Court and will likely last all day.

The following true bills were found by the Grand Jury up to 11 o'clock to-day: Commonwealth vs. J. M. Harding, Frank Hunter and H. B. McDonald, indicted first for committing an abortion, second for procuring an abortion, third for attempting to commit an abortion.

Commonwealth vs. J. M. Harding, indicted for murder in procuring an abortion; first count, by instruments; second count, by drugs.

Commonwealth vs. H. B. McDonald, Frank Hunter and J. M. Harding, indicted first for conspiring to procure an abortion; second, to commit an abortion by drugs.

Commonwealth vs. Howard Weber, indicted for producing an abortion and attempting to produce an abortion.

Commonwealth vs. Fred Reib, indicted for fornication and seduction.

Commonwealth vs. David Acheson, charged with killing and feloniously converting to his use one lamb belonging to Michael Mong, not a true bill and county pay the costs.

For the thirteen years included between 1875 and 1888, the black sand district of Bradford, in McKean county, and the Allegheny district in New York State, produced in the aggregate 165,466,000 barrels of oil. In June, 1882, these districts produced an average of 75,000 barrels per day, whereas, in December, 1888, they only produced 20,000 barrels per day, and the oil pools of all the "black sand" districts are being rapidly exhausted. Unless the new white sand pools of the southwest district of Pennsylvania can be depended upon for increased future production, the prominence of Pennsylvania oil pools in the production of the world, will not play as important a factor as in the past.—Civizen-Press.
