Party pride should have held the Republicans to the whole ticket, and the party has done itself an injury which cannot help but tell on future elections. It is a decidedly unpleasant duty to write about a defeat, and one to which we are by no means accustomed, hence we do not care to lengthen out this article. Mr. Doutt can stand the defeat, it is the party which suffers most.

At this writing the indications are that the balance of the ticket is elected by majorities ranging up to 225 or 250. Mr. White is elected Associate Judge by a majority that will be close to that for the State ticket, as are also Mr. Proper for Surveyor, and Dr. Stonecipher for Coroner.
