WHILE Chauncey F. Black has been sending out his appeals to the Democratic clubs to celebrate the anniversary of Jefferson's birthday, it is odd that he should have overlooked the anniversary of Jackson's birth, which has just been passed by without a ripple of Democratic enthusiasm. It is true that Jackson was not the same kind of a Democrat that Jefferson was, and Black is a different kind of Democrat still, but that is no reason for the display of so much partiality in the distribution of Democratic enthusiasm. Mr. Black must have forgotten that General Jackson gave the Democrats the offices, which is what the Democrats of the present are after.

Nor since reconstruction has there been a measure introduced in Congress of greater importance as relating to questions growing out of the war than the bill by Representative Lodge, of Massachusetts, to regulate elections of Representatives in Congress. It applies to all the States alike, and in operation would secure to every voter his rights. It has brought the fire-eaters of the South to their feet to oppose it. Such a law would give effect to the Constitution in every part of the Union. The substance of the Lodge bill is the Australian ballot system. Of late Mr. Cleveland has been lecturing and writing letters in behalf of this system; but his advocacy has always had reference to Northern States, where there is comparatively little need for it. In this way he has stirred up considerable interest among Democrats. The introduction of the Lodge bill will broaden the field for the display of zeal in behalf of ballot reform. The bill is bound to create great interest in and out of Congress. It goes to the bottom of the ballot reform question.—Pittsburg Times.
