THE Williamsport Republican very sensibly argues that some of the counties of the State are in too great hurry to elect their delegates to the State Convention. It is required that sixty days' notice of the State Convention shall be given, and there is really plenty of time between the call and the convention to name the delegates. The resignation of Prince Bismarck, Chancellor of the German Empire, and its acceptance by the young Emperor William, has stirred up no small amount of uneasiness among Europeans. But the feeling of distrust will likely die down shortly, and things will be moving along as though there had been no Bismarck. It is getting so that the welfare of a nation doesn't depend on any one man.

SENATOR SHERMAN'S new Anti-Trust bill provides that "arrangements, contracts, agreements, trusts or combinations" for the prevention of competition are to be declared "against public policy, unlawful and void." The United States Circuit Court is to have original jurisdiction in suits arising under the law, and the Attorney General and District Attorneys are directed to commence and prosecute the cases.

THE issue for 1892 has been fixed. It will be the struggle of 1888 over again—protection against not exactly free trade but against low duties. The Committee on Ways and Means has deliberately made the issue. It was in its power to advise a much more sweeping reduction than it has done and to add largely to the free list. Such a course would have forced the Democrats into a bold espousal of free trade. But it has chosen conservative methods, and the contest will be fought all over again at the polls.—Phila. Inquirer.

ONE more Democratic Congressman elected by fraud was compelled to walk the plank last Thursday, and a good Republican, who was elected by a majority of the votes, takes his place. Sydney E. Mudd, in the Fifth Maryland district, takes the place of Barnes Compton. Mr. Mudd, however, will serve but one term, as the Maryland Legislature has so gerrymandered the State that only one Republican can be elected hereafter, and he from the Hagerstown district.
