Horrifying Storms Cause Great Loss of Life.

The most terrific cyclone, whirlwind or hurricane that this country has ever known swept through parts of Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee and other Southern States last Thursday evening, destroying hundreds of lives, and doing untold damage to property of all kinds that lay in its track.

The city of Louisville and suburban towns suffered the greatest losses both in life and property, some of the smaller places being reported almost wiped out of existence. In Louisville the latest estimates place the number of killed between 200 and 300, with three times that many injured.
