That both of the men were cripples was not known to the club until after the arrests had been made, but a knowledge of the fact would not have hindered the prosecution. The older man of the two, who finally said that he was called James "Hoptoe," but made no denial when asked if his right name was not James Collins, was particularly impudent and foulmouthed. John H. Miller, who refused to give his name until the two were brought before 'Squire Reynolds this morning, was more calculated to excite pity. He said that he had a mother and sister to support and that, being a cripple, he supported them by hunting, trapping and fishing. Collins soon cooled off when brought before the 'Squire, and said that they were hunting and fishing to keep out of the poor house; that they belonged "down the river" and had commenced seining in the river above Tidionte a couple of weeks ago. He also pleaded for lieniency and promised to do no more illegitimate fishing. They further agreed to deliver their seine to the authorities to be destroyed, and in view of the fact that both were cripples the prosecution charitably refrained from proceeding further in the ease. They were remanded to the lockup until 8 o'clock this afternoon, when Major Franklin went up with them to Holman's Island to procure their seine and to release the large stock of fish they had caught illegitimately. The experience of these men should serve as a warning to This helps to improve the town.
