Although a Whig, he was elected to the 28th, 29th and 30th Congresses on the Democratic ticket. In 1854 he was elected Governor of Pennsylvania, held the office one term and declined a renomination. In May, 1861, he was appointed by President Lincoln director of the United States mint at Philadelphia, By his efforts the motto, "In God We Trust," was placed upon the national coins. In 1873 he became Superintendent of the mint, In 1886 Governor Pollock was appointed Federal Chief Supervisor of eletion, which was his last public office. The funeral was held last Tuesday and the interment was at Milton, his native home.
