THERE is scarcely any doubt but that ex-Speaker Carlisle will be elected to succeed the late U. S. Senator Beck from Kentucky.

GOVERNOR CAMPBELL, of Ohio, has his eye on the Democratic Presidential nomination in 1892. Another case of the mustard seed in a rain barrel.

SENATOR QUAY intimated recently that he will not vote for the House pension proposition unless the age entitling an ex-soldier to a service pension be placed at 50 instead of 60 years of age. He remarked that the soldiers of Pennsylvania do not care about being pensioned after they are dead. An investigation of the subject of longevity of the ex-soldiers of the State shows that sixty years is beyond the limit. The Senator will make his position understood when the measure comes before the Senate. It is an interesting fact in connection with pension legislation that the only two bills on that subject passed by the last two Congresses were those introduced by Senator Quay, granting increased pensions for deafness and total disability.

It is going the rounds of the newspapers that Tom Marshall, of Pittsburgh, does not endorse Pattison for governor. Marshall played the scalawag in 1882, by going to the State Convention as a delegate, voting for the nomination of Beaver for governor and bolting the ticket immediately thereafter, and helping to elect Pattison. If he has repented he will have to be forgiven, but it will be safe to keep an eye on him. A good many of the officers of the John Stewart meetings are seeking federal appointments as a reward for their party services.—*Meadville Gazette.*

WM. L. SCOTT says that Robert E. Pattison shall be the Democratic nominee for Governor; Eckley B. Cox and Congressman Kerr and various other leaders say that William A. Wallace shall be the nominee; William U. Hensel insists that Chauncey F. Black shall be given the nomination, and a great many of the rank and file, who do the voting, insist that Robert P. Dechert or R. Bruce Rickerts shall be their candidate. It is beginning to look as though Mr. Scott, with the aid of Mr. Hensel and John R. Read, would win, but keep an eye on the canny Scot from Clearfield.

SENATOR VEST is trying to amend the Inter-State Commerce law so as to include the express companies in its provisions. Why it hasn't been done before is one of the mysteries of legislation, but we suppose Congressmen owed too much express stock. But that they should come under the provisions of this law admits of no argument. They are common carriers, are inter-state and whack on the rates for all or more than the traffic will stand, at non-competitive points. The tariff on many articles to Tidouche prohibits their transportation, particularly early vegetables and fruits, and as a consequence our markets are not what they should be and the American express company hasn't had enough to accept living rates, evidently preferring no business to business at same rates given adjoining competitive points. Indeed we hope Senator Vest will prevail in his good work.—*Tidouche News.*

Tionesta suffers about the same complaint that our neighbors up the river do, and is compelled to pay outrageous express rates. Anyway, take the telegraph companies, the express companies and the highway robbers and without doubt they make more clear money than all other institutions combined.

WARREN, Venango and McKean counties held their Republican primaries last Saturday and resulted in placing good tickets in the field. Perhaps it was the hottest fight ever held in Warren county, the fight being mainly centered in the contests for the offices of President Judge and State Senator, resulting in the choice of George H. Higgins for the former place, and the re-nomination of Senator O. C. Allen for the latter. The balance of the ticket is as follows: Congress, Col. Watson; Associate Judge, Critt Marsh; Assembly, C. C. Thompson, re-nominated. Hon. Charles W. Stone was unanimously endorsed for Governor. In McKean county the fight was almost equally as hot, the contest being centered on Congress and State Delegates. Latest returns indicate that Col. Watson has the instructions from that county giving him a re-nomination in the district. Stone carried the county for Governor according to latest figures. In Venango county the principal fight was for State Delegates, and resulted in the choice of Senator Delamater's delegates by decisive majorities. Ex-Senator Lee received the instructions for Congress.

Republican Primary Rules.

RULES GOVERNING THE REPUBLICAN PRIMARY ELECTIONS OF FOREST COUNTY.  
1. The candidates for the several offices shall have their names announced in one or more of the county papers at least three weeks previous to the Primary Meetings stating the office, and subject to the action of the party at the said primary meetings.  
2. The voters belonging to the Republican party in each township and borough, shall meet on a day to be designated by the County Committee, at the usual place of holding spring elections, at 2 o'clock P. M., and proceed to elect one person for Judge, and two persons for Clerks who shall form a Board of Elections to receive votes and determine who are the proper persons to vote, and who shall hold the polls open until 7 o'clock P. M. After the polls are opened, the candidates announced shall be balloted for; the name of each person voting shall be written on a list at the time of voting, no person shall be allowed to vote more than once for the same office.  
3. After the polls are closed the board shall proceed to count the votes that each candidate has received, and make out the returns accordingly, to be certified by the Judge and attested by the Clerks.  
4. The Judge (or one of the Clerks appointed by the Judge) of the respective election district, shall meet at the Court House, in Tionesta, on the Tuesday following the Primary Meetings at 2 o'clock P. M., he shall receive a list of voters, and the person having the highest number of votes for any office, shall be declared the nominee for the Republican party.  
5. Any two or more persons having an equal number of votes for the same office, the Judges shall proceed to ballot for a choice, the person having the highest number to be the nominee.  
6. Any two or more persons having an equal number of votes for the same office, the Judges shall appoint Conferees—Representative, Senatorial and Congressional—whose acceptance of said appointment shall be a pledge to support the person who may receive the largest number of votes cast for that office.  
7. The Return Judges shall appoint Conferees—Representative, Senatorial and Congressional—whose acceptance of said appointment shall be a pledge to support the person who may receive the largest number of votes cast for that office.  
8. The Return Judges may at any time change the mode and manner of selecting candidates as they may be instructed by the people at their primary meetings, due notice being given by the County Committee.  
9. The Chairman of the County Committee shall be required to issue a call in pursuance of the action of the County Committee.
