Republican Primary Election.
 Pursuant to a Resolution of the County Committee, passed February 20th, it is ordered that the Republican voters of Forest County meet on

SATURDAY, JUNE 7th, 1890,
 at 2 o'clock p. m., at the following named places of holding Primary elections to-wit: Barnett, Jacob Mace's Carpenter Shop, Barnett, Huling's, Joseph Hall's Shop, Green, Upper, at Gulton School House, Green, Lower, at Nebraska, Forest House, Green, at Bowman's Mill, Harmony, Upper, at Fleming Hill, Harmony, Lower, at Adeler School House, Harmony, at West Hickory, Hickory, at East Hickory, Jenks, East, Hyrom's, Jenks, Central, Marienville, Jenks, Southern, Gilroye, Jenks, those living at Clough's Mills and vicinity, at Clough's Mills, Jenks, at Brown's Mill, Kingsley, Newtown, Kingsley, Whig Hill School House, Kingsley, Starr School House, Howe, East, Hirston, Howe, Middle, Cooper Tract, Howe, Elialia, at office of Peter Maloney, Tionesta Township, Court House, Tionesta twp., voters in vicinity of school house at B. Each Election Precinct will also elect one person for Member of the County Committee for the ensuing year.
 The polls will remain open until 7 p. m.
 Return Judges will convene at the Court House, Tionesta Borough, on the following Tuesday, June 10, at 2 o'clock p. m.
 Attention is called to the Act of June, 1881, regulating Primary Elections, that Judges and Clerks, before entering upon the discharge of their duties shall take and subscribe an oath or affirmation in presence of each other, viz:
 "I do (affirm or solemnly swear) that I will as Judge, Inspector or Clerk (as the case may be) at the election, election impartially and faithfully perform my duties in accordance with the laws and constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the Republican party of the County of Forest, for the government of said primary elections, meeting or caucus, to the best of my judgment and ability.
 This oath or affirmation to be first administered to the Judge by an Inspector, then the Judge can qualify the other officers or administer the oath to any elector offering to vote. The above form is given for convenience and is that prescribed by the Act aforesaid. And all boards will observe it closely, that the election may be conducted according to the rules of the Republican party in this County, and law governing primaries.

Republican Primary Rules.
RULES GOVERNING THE REPUBLICAN PRIMARY ELECTIONS OF FOREST COUNTY.
 1. The candidates for the several offices shall have their names announced in one or more of the county papers at least three weeks previous to the Primary Meetings stating the office, and subject to the action of the party at the said primary meetings.
 2. The voters belonging to the Republican party in each township and borough, shall meet on a day to be designated by the County Committee, at the usual place of holding spring elections, at 2 o'clock P. M., and proceed to elect one person for Judge, and two persons for Clerks who shall form a Board of Elections to receive votes and determine who are the proper persons to vote, and who shall hold the polls open until 7 o'clock P. M. After the polls are opened, the candidates announced shall be called for; the name of each person voting shall be written on a list at the time of voting, no person being allowed to vote more than once for the same office.
 3. After the polls are closed the board shall proceed to count the votes, the candidate has received, and make out the returns accordingly, to be certified by the Judge and attested by the Clerks.
 4. The Judge for one of the Clerks appointed by the Judge of the respective election district, shall meet at the Court House, in Tionesta, on the Tuesday following the Primary Meetings at 2 o'clock P. M., having the returns and a list of voters, and the person having the highest number of votes for any office, shall be declared the nominee for the Republican party.
 5. The Return Judges shall be competent to reject by a majority, the returns from any district where there is evidence of fraud, either in the returns or otherwise, and shall reject them where there is evidence of three or more persons voting at the Primary Meeting who are not Republicans.
 6. Any two or more persons having an equal number of votes for the same office, the Judges shall proceed to a ballot choice, the person having the highest number to be the nominee.
 7. The Return Judges shall appoint Conferees—Representative, Senatorial and Congressional—whose acceptance of said appointment shall be a pledge to support the person who may receive the largest number of votes, and for that office.
 8. The Return Judges may at any time change the mode and manner of selecting candidates as they may be instructed by the people at their primary meetings, due notice being given by the County Committee.
 9. The Chairman of the County Committee shall be required to issue a call in pursuance of the action of the County Committee.

 At the late annual meeting of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, of Erie Presbytery, held in Titusville, the responsibility of Christian nations for the exportation of alcoholic liquors, and the consequent increase of intemperance in heathen lands, was brought prominently forward in letters and addresses. A resolution was adopted as follows: "In view of the fact that for every missionary sent abroad 70,000 gallons of rum are exported from America, Resolved, That we give heed to the petition which comes from the Dark Continent beseeching Christian nations to send 'more gospel and less rum.'" The emergency of the hour calls for concerted action in Christian and philanthropic organizations.
