Republican State Candidates.

GEORGE WALLACE DELAMATER.

George Wallace Delamater, candidate for Governor, was born in Meadville, Crawford county, March 31st, 1849. He was graduated from Allegheny College in his native town in his twentieth year, and afterward entered the Harvard Law School. After having finished a thorough course in law he entered the office of L. H. Richmond & Sons, of Meadville, and was shortly afterward admitted to practice at the bar. He spent about three years in active professional life, at the end of which period he engaged in various business enterprises to which he has since devoted his time and energy with reasonable success. He is a member of the banking house of Delamater & Co., of Meadville, a director of the Merchants' National Bank, president and owner of a controlling interest in the Meadville and Linesville railway company, president of the Meadville fuel gas company, and actively connected with many other local enterprises. He has always been a staunch Republican, active in promoting the interests of his party. He was mayor of Meadville in 1876, Senatorial delegate to the State convention in 1878, chairman of the Republican county committee in the campaigns of 1878 and 1879, and in 1880 he was one of the Garfield Presidential electors for Pennsylvania. He was elected to the State Senate in 1886. Senator Delamater has proved his capacity for political leadership by his remarkable success in uniting the Republicans of the Northwestern part of the State in one unflinching phalanx for the support of Republican candidates in State campaigns in the past few years. His leadership and management of party affairs in his section of the State have been wise and discreet. His ability and executive capacity and his extraordinary faculty for organization were recognized by Senator Quay, chairman of the Republican National Committee, who called him to his side in the Presidential campaign of 1888, and it has been universally acknowledged that the services rendered the National chairman by the Crawford county leader in New York and elsewhere contributed in a very material degree to the success of the Presidential campaign. During his career in the State Senate, while he has been modest and always courteous, his practical knowledge of the needs of the people of the State, together with his industry and constant attention to his duties, combined with marked force of character and strong will, won for him the recognition of his associates, and he easily became the acknowledged leader of that body. It is accordingly not alone by reason of his education, experience, ability and character established in private life, but also because of his valuable services to the Republican party in its State and National campaigns, and his successful career as a legislator that he is entitled to and commands recognition and honor among the people of his native State.

AMONG the prominent Democrats who will be indifferent during the present campaign is ex Governor Curtin.

THE "old time Republican" who will change his politics this year is already figuring in the columns of the Democratic organs. He always does during July and August, and disappears about the middle of October.

THE death of General John C. Fremont, which occurred at his residence in New York on the 13th inst., removes from earth the first candidate of the Republican party for President, and most famous General and explorer. He was past 77 years of age.

THE bill admitting Idaho into Statehood was signed by the President in time for the new star to be added to the flag on the 4th of July of this year. Wyoming was a little late, the bill not reaching the President until the 10th, so that the 44th star will not be added until July 4th, 1891.

A most horrible cyclone swept over the vicinity of Red Wing, Minn., on Sunday evening last, causing the loss of upward of two hundred lives by latest estimates. Among the most disastrous casualties was the sinking of the excursion steamer Sea Wing, with 200 passengers aboard, but very few of whom were saved. The details of the awful catastrophe are truly appalling.

THE Hon. William A. Wallace is so enthusiastic in his support of the Scranton ticket that he will spend the campaign period in Europe. Therefore, if the Free trade and manufacturing regions of England and Belgium show up with big majorities for Pattison and Black, we shall know they are due to Mr. Wallace's rousing speeches over there in favor of the Democratic nominees.

ALTHOUGH a trifle late as a dove item it is the first opportunity we have had to record the fact that the Democrats at their Scranton convention, on July 2d, nominated Robert E. Pattison for Governor; Chauncey F. Black for Lieut. Governor, and Wm. H. Barclay of Pittsburgh, for Secretary of Internal Affairs. W. H. Harrity of Philadelphia, was elected chairman of the State Committee, but has since declined the honor. The ticket will be buried under 75,000 Republican majority of course.

and in 1882 became the Republican candidate for State Senator in the Twentieth district, which comprises in a large degree the mining portion of Lackawanna and Luzerne counties. Although the district is Democratic, Watres' personal popularity won him an election by a handsome majority. He was re-elected in 1886 by an increased majority. In 1887 he was appointed Inspector of Rifle Practice for the National Guard by Governor Beaver on account of the record for marksmanship made by Company A, of Scranton, of which he is captain. When he took charge of the department there were only 1,300 marksmen in the National Guard. Under his supervision the number has increased to 4,300. Senator Watres is largely interested in business enterprises in his district, and has a record at Harrisburg as an earnest worker and an able legislator.

THOMAS J. STEWART. Thomas J. Stewart, candidate for Secretary of Internal Affairs, was born near Belfast, Ireland, September 11th, 1848, and was brought to this country by his parents early in 1849. He resided in Narristown, Montgomery county, since that time; was educated in the common schools of Narristown, and at the Quaker City Business College, in Philadelphia. At the age of 16 years he entered the army, serving as private in company "C," One Hundred and Thirty-eighth regiment Pennsylvania Volunteers, and was discharged therefrom June 23d, 1865. After his return home, he completed his studies and entered into business life. Since 1870, he has been identified with the manufacture of window glass, both as manufacturer and dealer. Since 1882, has been Assistant Adjutant General of the Department of Pennsylvania, Grand Army of the Republic, and was also appointed Assistant Adjutant General of the United States, in the same organization, for the years 1884 and 1885. Has been identified with the National Guard of Pennsylvania since 1869, and has been adjutant of the Sixth regiment infantry since 1877. Served as a member of the House of Representatives from Montgomery county 1885 and 1886, and was the author of the act known as the "Soldiers' Burial Bill," which was passed over the Governor's veto. Was appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives as a member of the commission to locate and establish a home for disabled and indigent soldiers and sailors in Pennsylvania, and upon the organization of the commission was made secretary, and afterwards was elected secretary of the board of trustees.
