AN amendment to the Tariff bill has been introduced in the Senate, placing a duty on sugar, varying from three-tenths of a cent per pound to one cent per pound, according to grade, and "providing that if an export duty shall hereafter be laid upon sugar or molasses by any country from whence the same may be imported, such sugar or molasses so imported shall be subject to duty as provided by law prior to the passage of this act." This provision will prevent sugar raising countries from taking advantage of a low import duty to keep up the price to consumers by putting on an export duty.
