The Republican Judicial Conference of this, 37th, district, met at the Court House, pursuant to adjournment, yesterday at 2 o'clock, but without effecting a nomination. In accordance with a resolution passed at the last meeting, to the effect that ten ballots be taken and if no nomination be made the conference to stand adjourned sine die, balloting began, each candidate receiving three votes, until ten ballots were taken. The chairman then declared the conference adjourned sine die. This leaves both Mr. Higgins and Mr. Irwin in the field, and according to a card from each published in this issue both will remain until election day. We have no comments to make at this time, but will admonish our Democratic friends not to try to extract any comfort out of the situation, as they'll only suffer the greater disappointment when the votes are counted in the fall. The grangers are still waiting for Farmer Pattison to explain his failure to attend their big picnic the other day, after having accepted an invitation to be present. This is to be a campaign of explanations for Mr. Pattison and now is his time to begin. Mr. MAPES, who at one time lived in Pleasantville, this County, and subsequently displayed considerable ability in editing a feed store in Trestolia, is spoken of as the prospective head of the Independent Pattison organization. As he has for a number of years been engaged in the Independent Republican work of writing Democratic editorials for McClure's Philadelphia Times he ought to be well qualified for the position.—Oil City Blizzard.
