A Sad Fatality.

On Monday evening of this week, at Nebraska, one of the saddest fatalities that has yet taken place in that section, occurred just as the men were about leaving their work for the day, the unfortunate victim being Addison Walters, son of James Walters, of Newmansville, and brother of Charles Walters of this place. The board of township road commissioners, of which the deceased was a member, were removing the timbers of the old bridge that spans the creek pond at that place, in order to facilitate the work of building the abutments of the new iron bridge in course of construction. They were taking the timbers down separately in order to save the iron that was in them.
