NEWSY NOTES.

In Jamestown, N. Y., a girl baby has just been born, whose mother is 21 years old, grandmother 38 years old, great grandmother 53 years old and great great grandmother 75 years old, and but one daughter living of each generation.

Albert Miller, of Harrisburg, is under arrest in Cameron county for the murder of Chris Drum, whose remains were found on a wagon road near Emporium, on the 22d of November, 1889. Drum just previous to the murder had been employed in Miller's camp near Smethport, and when his remains were found, they could only be identified by a photograph and papers found in his clothing. Philadelhis detectives have been working up the use, and they have brought it to a sucessful issue, establishing evidence that Drum was put out of the way for his valuables. The trial comes off in November. -McKenn Miner. The Rochester Democrat says it is

stated on good authority that the famous Kinzua Viaduet is soon to be removed because it is not heavy enough for the rapidly increasing traffic carried over it. The span is over a deep gorge formed by Kingua Creek. It is 2,052 feet long, and 301 feet above the water. It was built for a single track at a cost of \$237,000. It consists of twenty towers, each 10 feet by 38; inches at the top, and of varying width at the bottom, the highest being 103 feet by 381 feet at the base. These towers are built of Phoenix iron columns in 30 feet sections, and connected by internal wrought iron sleeper joints. The viaduct was designed to hold a weight of 206 tons This is equal to a load of 3,075 pounds per lineal foct of track. This viaduct carries a branch of the New York, Lake Erie & Western from the petroleum fields of Me-Kean county to the coal fields of Elk county. It is the highest structure of the kind in the world. It was commenced May 5, 1882, and completed August 25, 1882-in less than four months. There is some question as to whether the viaduct will be replaced or a detour made in the line of the road. When the viaduet was first contemplated it was found that the detour would cost \$3,000 more than the viaduct, but if the viaduct is built of heavier material it may be found that it will east more than to make the detour. The viaduct for years has been one of the famous bridges of the world, and has been visited and examined by many eminent engineers and railroad men of this and
