

The net Republican plurality on the Congressional vote in the State is almost 50,000, and for an off year this is very good and indicates that in a Presidential year Pennsylvania is good for its regular 80,000.

Of course the tin-plate manufacturers that were to have been established in Pittsburgh have been driven away by the result of the election. Men don't want to throw their money away. But look what a number of American workmen would have been given employment.

The Farmers' Alliance Democrats and straight-out Democrats in the North Carolina Legislature are fighting over who shall be sent to the United States Senate. Between the two there may be such a falling out that we may have hopes of North Carolina being well represented in the Senate.

Thus far the aspirants for the Speakership of the next House of Representatives of Pennsylvania, are Brooks, of high license fame, and Riter, of Philadelphia; Capp, of Lebanon; Baker of Delaware; Burdick of McKean; Finley of Washington; Graham of Allegheny, and Bliss of Delaware.

The Boston Transcript, which is decidedly independent in its politics, and not a strict high tariff paper, calls attention to the statement of a gentleman closely identified with the woolen business, that \$5,000,000 in new money will be put into new woolen manufacturing machinery, plants and the like, within the next few months as a result of the stimulus given to the business by the new tariff law.

It must be highly gratifying to the Democrats to know that jubilee meetings are being held all over Europe to celebrate the Democratic victory, which over there is regarded as the first step towards free trade. Let the man who "earns his bread by the sweat of his brow" devote a few minutes to studying, and then let him ask himself "why these Europeans are rejoicing at Democratic success?"

Wool produced in Nevada has been pronounced, by experts, superior to the finest Australian wool, and it's thirteen cents a pound cheaper than the imported article. Nothing can stop our progress but the adoption of Democratic free trade ideas, which would prove a mill-stone around the neck of our industries.

The N. Y. Legislature being Democratic, Chas. A. Dana, the veteran of the N. Y. Sun, is brought forward to succeed Wm. M. Everts as U. S. Senator. We don't know who sprung the scheme, but we heartily endorse it. We know of no Democrat in that State to whom we can give so hearty a support. Mr. Dana with his ability, modern ideas and sound economic doctrines of government would shake many of the antique cobwebs from that musty chamber.—Tidoutie News

SENATORIAL.

The return Senatorial Judges of this, the 38th Senatorial District, viz: James Russell, of Clarion; R. B. Crawford, of Forest; Michael Brennan, of Cameron, and Geo. R. Dixon, of Elk, met at Ridgway on Tuesday, the 11th inst., to compute and certify returns. The result was as follows:

Dixon, secretary, and Michael Brennan, spokesman, waited upon Senator Hall, at his office in Ridgway, congratulated him and presented him with a certificate of his election.—Elk Democrat.
