There is reason why they should be open, as people who denounce hidden ways so fervently as the farmers do should make their practice agree with their precepts. Besides, all the past tells us that an organization designed to affect national policies never prospered in the dark. What the farmers should do is to turn on the light, and invite inspection. There is no one who wants to circumvent them or defeat an honest expression of their will.—Pittsburg Times.

Municipal Governments.

"Gossip," in the Harrisburg Telegraph, makes these very sensible criticisms on an article written by College President White, which will apply to some extent to smaller towns than cities:

Hon. Andrew D. White cannot be said to have a very high opinion of the government of the cities of the United States, and he has made a very careful examination into the policy which prevails in most of them. In the Forum for December he pronounces this verdict: "Without the slightest exaggeration we may assert that, with very few exceptions, the city government of the United States are the worst in christendom—the most expensive, the most inefficient, and the most corrupt." Just how the government of American cities compares with that of the cities of other lands we do not know, and considering the difference in circumstances and environments, it is scarcely fair to compare our city governments with those of other lands, because here the individual governors are constantly changing, in an no other country of which we have any knowledge is this the case. But while we agree with Mr. White that our city governments are inefficient and expensive, we do not admit that they are corrupt. This may be the case in the larger cities but it is not so in the small. Generally the affairs of the small cities of the country are honestly administered.

Gossip firmly believes, too, that the expensive and inefficient government is due very largely to the fact that not only our administrative officers but our legislative bodies are constantly changing, and because of this the cities are without well considered, settled and intelligent management. The policy changes with every recurring spring, as it brings into the administration new men, with little or no knowledge of the real needs of the city, but full of theories and zeal, and these two when intelligence and knowledge of the city's condition are lacking, make the mess of it from which so many of our small municipalities are suffering. But councilmen and officers are not corrupt. In fact in most cases there is nothing to corrupt them; it is generally a struggle to get the funds to meet honest and pressing claims. And this condition will continue just so long as our cities draw their business managers at such frequent intervals from the "popular fellows" of the wards, and many of them too who look upon a city office as merely the round in a ladder up which they are climbing to something higher. It is the policy, and not the men, that is bad.
