Big Fire at Stowtown.

The extensive and finely appointed band saw mill of Wheeler, Dusenbury & Co., at Stowtown, two miles above the village of East Hickory, was totally destroyed by fire on Sabbath morning last. The watchman had left the mill at half past four o'clock, and had post of duty in Harrisburg the latter extinguished all the lights and fires about the premises, and at five o'clock the mill was discovered to be on fire, and under such headway that it could not be extinguished.
