

GREAT WARRIORS PASSING AWAY.

ADMIRAL D. D. PORTER.

David D. Porter, Admiral of the U. S. Navy, died at his home in Washington, D. C., on Friday morning, Feb. 13, 1891. His death resulted from fatty degeneration of the heart, from which he had suffered since last summer.

GENERAL WILLIAM T. SHERMAN.

The death of this last of the great and conspicuous figures of the late war occurred at his residence in New York, on Saturday last, 14th inst. President Harrison in a message to Congress pays this tribute to the great warrior:

The death of William Tecumseh Sherman is an event that will bring sorrow to the heart of every patriotic citizen. No living American was so loved and venerated as he. To look upon his face; to hear his name, was to have one's love of country intensified. He served his country, not for fame, not out of a sense of professional duty, but for love of the flag and of the beneficent civil institutions of which it was the emblem.

THE PROPOSED NEW ROAD LAW.

A Very Comprehensive Summary of the Measure Which Will Likely Become the Law of the State.

The proposed new road law, prepared by the State Road Commission, is a very comprehensive measure. It contains about 5,000 words and is divided into 24 sections. The following is a careful summary of its provisions:

The first section provides that on the third Tuesday of February, 1892, in every township of the Commonwealth, three Supervisors shall be elected, one to serve for one year, one for two years and one for three years. A Supervisor shall be elected annually thereafter at each township election to serve for three years.

In section 2 the Supervisors are instructed to assemble at the place of meeting of the township auditors on the first Monday in March after their election, be sworn, and organize by electing one of their number President and another Secretary. If there is no Township Treasurer they are to appoint a Treasurer outside their number. They are then to levy a road tax not to exceed 10 mills on the dollar of valuation, except by authority of the Court of Quarter Sessions.

A HOME MARKET FOR LABOR.

Section 3 directs that while the road Supervisors shall have full control of road masters and the employment of labor on roads and bridges, tax-paying residents of the township between the ages of 18 and 60 shall be given the preference, provided they ask for the work before the first Monday of May of each year.

The fourth section provides that machinery which is too expensive to be purchased by one township may be bought jointly by two townships in the same county, the machinery to belong to the township in proportion to the amount invested.

Section 5 directs the Supervisors to file with the Township or District Treasurer a duplicate designating the amount of road tax levied against each taxpayer and to give him a warrant to collect the same as follows: On or before the 1st of October the Treasurer between June 1 and October 1 of each year the taxpayers will be required to pay the full amount of road tax levied against them, and on October 1 in each year the Treasurer shall make out a list of all delinquent taxpayers, with the amount of road tax levied against each, with 5 per cent. added thereto as a penalty for such delinquency.

Section 6 directs that the amount of road tax levied against each, with 5 per cent. added thereto as a penalty for such delinquency, shall be paid to the Treasurer on or before the 1st of October. The Treasurer shall receive the 5 per cent. The Supervisors are to fix the compensation of the Treasurer, not to exceed 1 per cent. of all the money he handles.

AMPLER SECURITY REQUIRED.

Section 7 requires the Township or District Treasurer or the Treasurer appointed by the Supervisors to give a bond in double the amount of road tax, duplicate and money received from the State appropriation. There must be two sureties, one a resident of the township, and the other a resident of the County of Forest, signed by the president and attested by the secretary.

In the seventh section the Supervisors are instructed to make the road beds not less than 16 feet wide and maintain them 10 inches higher in the center than at the sides, with drains at the sides. All obstructions to the flow of the water are to be removed and where practicable culverts of stone or iron or terra cotta pipe are to convey the water across and under the road beds.

Section 8 directs the Supervisors to compensate the traveling and other expenses. Section 9 directs the Board of Supervisors of townships receiving State aid to report to the County Engineer before the first Monday in March, each year the

whole amount of money raised during the year by taxation for road purposes. The report must specify the sums expended for maintaining or repairing roads, for creating and building new roads, for macadamizing or otherwise permanently improving roads, the number of miles so made and such other information as the County Engineer or Secretary of Internal Affairs.

Section 10 directs the Supervisors to keep minutes and such other books as they may find necessary, the same to be always open to the inspection of any taxpayer at reasonable times, and to be submitted for the information of the township auditors when they meet to audit the accounts of the treasurer and other township officers.

Section 11 requires the Supervisors to let by contract the construction of highways and permit the election of a contractor to let by contract all the other work. Three weeks' notice is to be given by advertisement in two papers and by hand bills. Approval security is to be required from contractors in double the amount of contract price. No contract is to continue more than three years.

The twelfth section provides for the election in each county of a County Engineer at the next general election and triennially thereafter for a term of 3 years. Counties where such an officer is elected by existing laws are excepted, also those whose limits are coextensive with a city. He is to assume office the first Monday in January succeeding the election.

Section 13 fixes the pay of the County Engineer at \$3.50 per day for each day of actual and necessary service. Five cents is the rate of mileage allowed. The Engineer is required to submit annually to the County Auditors a sworn statement of the days and nature of the business in which he was employed during the year, to be audited as other accounts are audited. This section also provides that the pay allowed by the act shall be in lieu of other compensation and expenses, except stationery, postage, office rent, light and fuel, which shall be provided by the said County Commissioners of the several counties effected by this act.

Section 14 fixes the duties of the County Engineer. The most important are to pass on road petitions presented to him; to provide for the laying out of roads to be permanently constructed out of funds devoted to the purpose by the act, such roads to form a continuous highway between populous parts of the county and to be known as "highways," and to furnish the Supervisor with full specifications in accordance with the most improved methods of road making.

Section 15 requires the signatures of 10 taxpayers to petitions for road viewers. The endorsement of the Supervisors and County Engineer are required before they can be acted on by the Court. Where a township has no road worthy the name of "highway" the County Engineer may petition the Court. When roads are desired to be opened, notice must be posted in the vicinity 10 days before the view, and where they are to cross the railroad canals or turnpikes, the president of such corporations is to have notice by registered letter.

Section 16 empowers the Court of Quarter Session, on petition properly signed and indorsed, to appoint three viewers to lay out new roads or to vacate useless ones. The viewers shall consist of the County Engineer and two disinterested citizens of the county.

Section 17 directs the County Engineer to inspect the work done on highways by contractors, and if they have not fulfilled their contracts he is directed to notify the Supervisors, who will withhold the money until the roads are completed according to agreement.

In section 18 the County Engineer is directed to report to the Secretary of Internal Affairs the work done on "highways," roads and bridges in the township under his jurisdiction. The report is required to contain full information respecting cost and extent of work and comparisons with former conditions.

Section 19 directs the Secretary of the Internal Affairs to furnish to the Supervisors, through the County Engineer, blanks on which to make the reports and to make the distribution of State appropriation. The secretary shall make a connected plan of the "highways" in the several counties and also an annual summary of the reports of the County Engineers.

Section 20 provides that money appropriated by the Legislature for road purposes shall be distributed among townships proportion to the amounts they collect and expend for road purposes. The State Treasurer is to pay the proper sums to the township or district treasurer or to the treasurer appointed by the Supervisors. Supervisors are required to set apart 25 per cent of the money raised by taxation and the whole of the State appropriation to be used in making Macadam or other permanent roads and this to be kept in a separate account from other road funds.

Section 21 directs that pipe line, conduit telegraph, telephone, electric light, power lines, cable transportation or other incorporated companies wishing to occupy public roads shall file with the County Engineer and Supervisor a map showing the manner and extent of the occupation. The corporations may, by those officials, be required to file bonds with the Court of Quarter Sessions to do the work under the direction of the County Engineer, to interfere with travel as little as possible, and to put the road in as good, or better condition as before they occupied it after the work is completed.

Section 22 makes it a misdemeanor for Supervisors or County Engineer to be interested, directly or indirectly, in work done on roads and bridges, and fixes the punishment at a fine not to exceed \$500, or imprisonment not exceeding six months, both or either at the discretion of the Court.

Section 23 declares it a misdemeanor for any County Engineer, Supervisor or any person employed to work on roads or bridges to violate any of the provisions of the act. The penalty is \$500 fine or six months imprisonment or both.

Section 24 provides that Supervisors elected under the act shall perform all the duties and be subject to all the responsibilities and penalties as "Supervisors of Roads, Bridges and Highways" under existing laws, except where the same is inconsistent with the provisions of this act.
